RIDDLE ROD AND GUN CLUB HOLD MEETING

The Riddle Rod and Gun Club held an enthusiastic meeting last night. This meeting was called for the purpose of arranging the details and making preparations for the big venison barbecue which is to take place at Riddle, Oregon, September 6. As usual with the Riddle Gun Club meetings, the entire town apparently was out. The Riddle Band furnished music for the occasion. State Game Warden Carl D. Shoemaker and a number of business men of Roseburg were in attendance, among whom were S. C. Bartram, secretary of the Oregon Sportsmen's League; Henry Harth, Harry Pearce, and Orin Thompson.

Mr. Shoemaker outlined in a measure the policy of the new commission in handling the business of the game department. He said that the new commission wanted to devote as much of the fund as possible in the re-stocking of streams; that they did not propose to decrease the game warden service in the state yet expected to conduct an economical administration. They desired to increase the efficiency and to conduct a comprehensive educational campaign of game protection. Mr. Shoemaker said that the officials of the game department fully realized that they must have the co-operation of the people and sportsmen throughout the state in order to get the greatest protection. The present commission is composed of big men, business men the majority of whom are enthusiastic sportsmen and fully understand the needs in this respect. Mr. Shoemaker's address was instructive as well as impressive.

Other speakers of the evening were S. C. Bartram, Henry Harth, and Harry Pearce. Mr. Pearce enlarged the Riddle Rod and Gun Club on their energy and manner of doing things. Mr. Pearce, being at the head of the Roseburg Commercial Club and a live wire himself, gave one of his characteristic speeches, which was loudly applauded.

The meeting last night was a continuation of the meeting which was held Saturday night at which time the Riddle club held their annual election of officers and at which time the following officers were elected: W. Q. Brown president; H. A. Rasor, vice-president; I. P. Gardner, secretary and treasurer. The executive committee is composed of D. W. Crosby, G. W. Riddle, W. H. Hartley and A. R. Marsh. At the meeting Saturday J. H. Driscoll, district deputy game warden, was present and gave a fine talk along the lines of co-operation and promised his aid and support to the club in every way.
