GERMANS TAKE MANY CAPTIVE

Assault Ends in The Capture of Many Frenchmen.

ORDERS ISSUED TO SUBMARINE HEADS

Austrian Village Said to Have Been Burned and Pillaged By The Serbian Soldiers.

BERLIN, July 14.—The French positions northeast of Vienna Le Chateau were stormed by the Germans yesterday and the enemy driven back for more than half a mile, the war office announced. In a successful assault, the Germans took 2680 prisoners. Two hundred Bersaglieri are reported to have invaded an Austrian village of Lorenzo, outraged the women, pillaged the homes and sent the mayor and ten civilians to Italy as hostages, according to letters made public by the government press bureau.

There has also been a renewal of activity in other areas of France and Belgium, but nothing comparable with the strategic importance of the Sochez struggle. The Germans lay claim to the destruction of the British position on Hill 60, near Ypres, but this finds no confirmation from either French or British sources. The situation in Poland and Gall-

cia has not yet reached a crisis, and Warsaw appears to be in no immediate danger.

Whether the British and French or the Germans will be the first to take the general offensive in the west is a big question, for it is felt that one side or the other must strike before long; otherwise another winter of tedious trench warfare is inevitable.

Submarines More Careful.

AMSTERDAM, July 14.—Reports that the German commanders of submarines have been instructed to be more careful of human lives since the Lusitania was sunk, are partly corroborated in a semi-official dispatch from Berlin. Reviewing the submarine warfare, the statement declares "the loss of life is remarkably small, as the submarine using every precaution, gives ample warning and time to leave the ships if no resistance is offered."

COUNTRY FUED STIRRING PRESIDENT'S SUMMER HOME

WINDSOR, Vt., July 14.—When President Wilson arrived here for his vacation he found himself in the midst of a somewhat acrimonious neighborhood feud. Winston Churchill, the celebrated author, was the storm center. And the president observed strict neutrality.

A high board fence, the cause of so much neighborly contention, was the cause belli of the dispute that agitated the authors colony in the Cornish hills about the president's summer house.

"Harlakenden House," occupied by the president as a summer residence was formerly the home of Churchill, when it was leased by the president. Churchill took another quaint, but large country house about two miles distant east of the president's and the Connecticut river. Churchill liked the house, but didn't enjoy proximity of the much traveled road that then ran right

past his front stoop, stirring up clouds of dust to be wafted into his rooms and also marring his privacy.

So the author got permission from the county authorities to change the course of the road—at his own expense. He switched the road away around his house, building a sharp turn and macadamizing it. He also dug down and built a costly concrete bridge, with iron rails across a gully.

After completing the road and bridge, Churchill then proceeded to build a high board fence along it, to shut his house off from the road. Then the storm broke. The whole countryside objected. Most of all, it is said, Churchill's own friends raised the loudest roars. They said a high board fence marred the scenic beauty of the exclusive summer residence section.

NEW YORK, July 14.—The attorneys for the state and defense have made their closing arguments to the jury in the Thaw sanity trial. Justice Hendricks is expected to deliver his instructions early this afternoon, and it is believed that a verdict will be returned before night.

PARIS, July 14.—Soissons is again under heavy bombardment from the German guns. The enemy is evidently attempting to level Soissons, the war office stated. Several long range guns are in action on a plateau across the Aisne, hurling a shower of shells. Fires have again broken out in Arras which also is being fiercely shelled. An attempt to storm the British positions southwest of Pilken was repulsed with heavy losses, is officially announced. The British met the German attack with a steady fire from their machine guns.
