

Austrian Village Said "To Have Been Burned and Pillaged By By The Serblan Soldiere.

BERLIN, July 14,-The French positions northeast of Vienne Le Chateau were stormed by the Germans yesterday and the enemy driven back for more than half a mile, the war office announced. In a suc cossful assault, the Germans took 2680 prisoners. Two hundred Bersagleri are reported to have invaded an Austrian village of Lorenzo, outraged the women, pillaged the homes and sent the mayor and ten civilians. to Italy as hostages, according to letters made public by the government press bureau,




