THE CAPTURE OF WARSAW

No one understands the value of the spectacular in war better than the German Kaiser, and his military advisors. For this reason the fall of Warsaw is to be made the occasion of regal pomp by the presence of the Emperor and Empress who will march at the head of the victorious columns. So absolutely sure are the German commanders that their plans will not miscarry, that they have forecast the day on which this is to happen, and there is but little doubt that they will be right. Warsaw will fall on the ordained date as sure as the sun rises, unless something totally unexpected or miraculous should happen, and it can safely be asserted it will not. A victory of any nature is elating to the victors and their adherents, and in the resulting exultation the cost and sacrifice necessary to its accomplishment is forgotten for the moment. Already Berlin is wild with excitement and joy over the anticipated occupation of an enemy stronghold and principal city, and this joy may serve to mask some of the sorrow for the terrible cost. For the very purpose of cheering those back of the lines, and encouraging those on the battle front, it can be taken as a matter of fact that neither the Kaiser nor his generals will miss the opportunity of making the entrance into Warsaw as ceremonial and magnificent as possible.

A POINTED QUESTION.

FOREST NOTES.

The forest service is making a collection of specimens of lupine and loco weed—plants which often poison stock at this season of the year—for the bureau of plant industry, in order that this bureau may carry on experiments with these plants to determine their toxic properties. Seed in the pod will also be sent to the experiment station at Salt Lake, Utah for the same purpose.

Forest fires are unnecessary, are nearly always the result of carelessness, and may wipe out in an hour what nature has taken years to create. In fact:

- They destroy existing forests.
- They destroy young growth, which means future forests.
- They destroy the beauty of the region.
- They destroy a great market for labor.
- They destroy prosperity.
- They destroy homes.
- They destroy lives.

Forest fires can be prevented by:
Never leaving a camp fire until it is out.
Never making a camp fire in loaves, rotten wood or against a log.
Never tossing away burning matches or tobacco.
Never burning brush, grass, or slashings during a dry season.

SHE FINDS GERMANY IS IN EXHALATION

NEW YORK, July 21.—(Special)—"We work by day and weep at night," was the heroic remark of a German woman in a hospital in Berlin to Miss Angela Morgan, the poet, and Miss Rebecca Shelly, delegates to the recent Women's Peace Conference at The Hague, who arrived home aboard the Holland-American liner "Rotterdam."

"At one of the American Red Cross hospitals in Munich," said Miss Morgan, "we saw scores of poor men who had been blinded in battle. They were making pitiful efforts to learn to read and write under the new conditions."

"The face of one poor fellow had been so mangled that he will have to wear a mask over it the rest of his life. He had been engaged to marry when the war started."

"There is a wonderful spirit everywhere in Germany. The soldiers sing as they march away. The children and grown-ups sing in the streets. The whole people seem to be living in a state of wonderful exhalation."

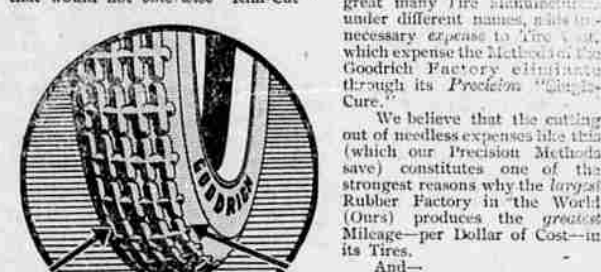
