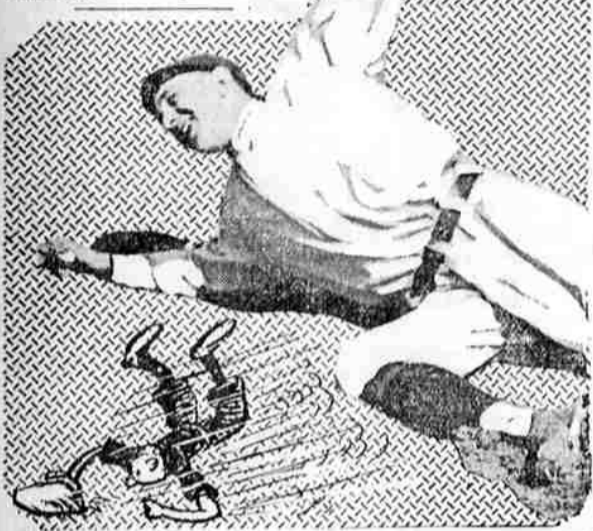


## HERE'S A BALL PLAYER WHO DOESN'T PLAY BASEBALL; HE WRITES IT.

### CAPTAIN ROYAL MACKLIN

Richard Harding Davis is the best news reporter on earth, when you read him you feel as though you were there. It is just facts that happen very, very fast. You know how you feel when a hundred-piece regimental band comes blaring and booming by. Well, you feel like that, only more so when you see Captain Macklin, the greatest master-painter at the Palace theatre for tonight only, with Lillian Gish, Jack Conway, Jack Dillon and a great star cast. Grandson of a famous general, we see Royal Macklin dismissed from West Point and re-

turns home to find that his cousin Beatrice still loves him. Despite her desire that he settle down and go to work, he leaves for Honduras, where a revolution is in progress and is presented to General Laguerre, who fought with his grandfather. ### A. C. VERNON DIES THIS MORNING

A. C. Vernon, a pioneer preacher and farmer of Oregon and Douglas county, died early this morning at his home in West Roseburg. Mr. Vernon was born in Cole county, Missouri, October 5, 1844, and came to Oregon in the year 1853. He became a member of the Christian church when 18 years of age and for 40 years gave faithful service as a minister. He then purchased a farm at Looking Glass, where he made his home for several years, moving to this city about a year ago. He is survived by a wife and three children, one son and two daughters, J. A. Vernon, formerly of this city, but at present residing in Portland; Mrs. Darnel, of Oakesdale, Wash., and Mrs. G. T. Stivers, of Eugene. Word has been sent to the relatives, notifying them of their father's death and no arrangements will be made for the funeral services until their arrival.
