

MRS. FELS FINDS USE FOR TAINTED MONEY



MRS. FELS

What to do with tainted money is a puzzle to Mrs. Mary Fels. She uses it to combat the source of the taint. Nearly \$70,000 realized in a recent deal will be spent in an effort to make land speculation unprofitable.

The land in question was eleven and a half acres at Sixtieth and Gingseng streets in West Philadelphia. The late Joseph Fels, soap manufacturer and single taxer, bought it for \$32,500. It sold, without further improvement for \$100,000. A house that stood on the property was used, during his ownership, as a working girls home. Part of the profits have gone toward a new home. The bulk of the money will be spent in educating toward an increase tax on site values.

Fels entered into the transaction for two reasons. He was giving the

bulk of his income to the fight against "unearned increment." Why not make increment finance its own destruction? Also he used the tract in question as a platform illustration of what he was opposing.

"I did not make the land," he used to say. "I did not do one stroke of work to improve it. The growth and activity of Philadelphia increases its value. The people of Philadelphia are making me a present daily of money that I am not entitled to. Since the law says it is mine, I will put it to the best use I know of, to fight the system which makes it burden possible."

Fels died in 1914 without selling the property. His widow, who is carrying on his work, has sold it and is using the money in accordance with his wishes.

LITTLE INTEREST IN ROSENTHAL MEETING

The meeting called at the Commercial club last evening, under the auspices of the local Parent-Teachers

Association, was very poorly attended in point of numbers. Mr. C. W. M. Smith presided and first presented Miss Clara Louise Strong, who made an altogether too short address on a topic with which she is very familiar—the industrial progress of children. She is a pleasing speaker of attractive personality, and the ten minutes allotted her were all too short. She brought out very plainly in the few minutes at her disposal that any child of average intelligence is fitted and encouraged when it accomplishes anything, whether it be physical or mental, and that it is the natural desire of youth to accomplish something. This may often take the form of apparent destructiveness in an effort to see whether it can replace the things it has taken apart. Miss Stone promised to return at some future time if conditions warranted it, and she asked the parents and the teachers to encourage the industrial creative habit in the children.

Mr. Rosenthal, on being introduced, proceeded to inaugurate a "love feast" as he styled it, and declared that the basis and foundation of heaven eternal was love, brotherly love. After discoursing for about three-quarters of an hour on various topics and this, he stated that the real idea of the meeting was to form a branch of the National Peace Society, with the intention of petitioning congress to establish a branch of the government under a department, the head of which was to be a member of the president's cabinet.
