DEMONSTRATION OF SUMMER PRUNING OF FRUIT TREES

Prof. W. S. Brown, extension horticulturist of O. A. C., will give a public demonstration and lecture on summer pruning and other pruning practices at Booth and Fisher orchard, Winston locality, at 9 a. m., and 2 p. m. at orchard of R. W. Hinkley, near Umpqua river bridge at entrance of Garden Valley and in other orchards in these vicinities on Friday, August 20.

His pruning demonstration will consist chiefly of pruning young apple, pear and prune trees at the critical age, to induce early fruit bearing from four to seven years. This demonstration will be very important for fruit growers at this time, as summer pruning for trees of this age is recommended at the time the terminal buds have formed at the end of the shoots. Under our conditions this season, the time for this pruning will be the latter part of this month.
