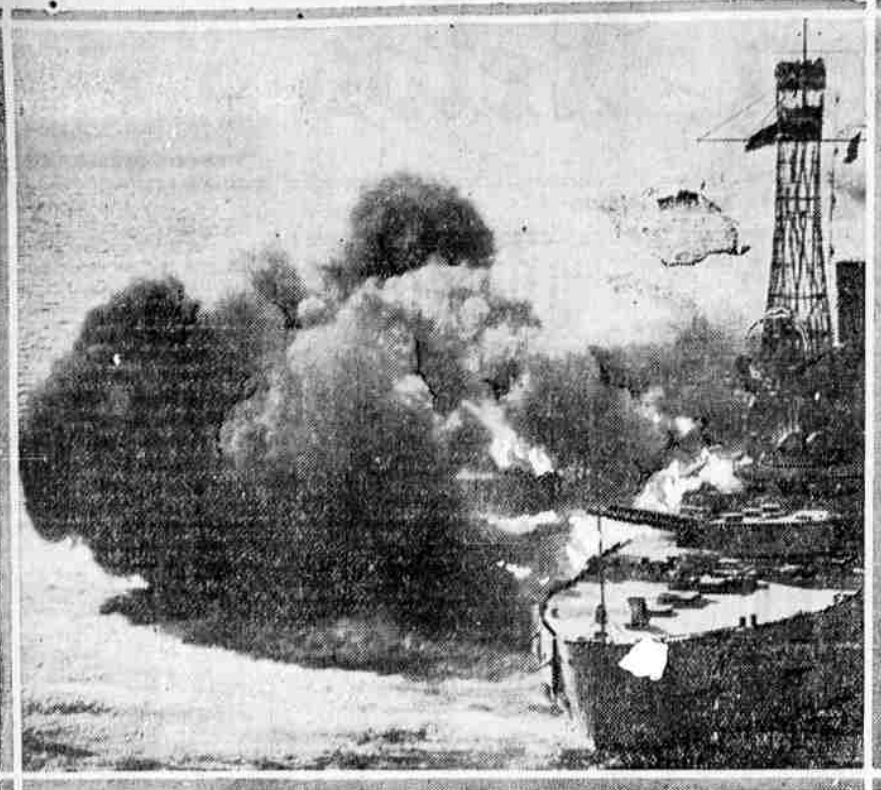

### ROSEBURG PARTY ASCENDS MT. SCOTT

A party of Roseburg people composed of Mrs. F. L. Dillard, and daughters, Gertrude and Alta, Lillian Krogel, Rollis Patterson and Ed. King, made the ascent of Mt. Scott this morning, according to a long distance telephone to The News from the summit. Mrs. Dillard states that the view from where they are is wonderful and through the distant haze they can see Mt. Hood and Mt. Shasta, over two hundred miles away. It took the party about four hours to attain the summit, and they intended to take their noon lunch there before making the descent. The message was sent from the ranger's station at the extreme top of the mountain and was very distinct. Mrs. Dillard and party are camping at the base of Mt. Scott, and she states that the fishing is fine, but there are few hunters and they have seen but little game. The station is in charge of Ranger Cripp, who said he had seen no forest fires this far. It was very cold there early in the morning, but the day had turned out one of great beauty and warmth.

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON, you are hereby required to appear and answer to plaintiff's complaint against you now on file in the above named court and cause on or before the last day of the time prescribed in the order for publication of this summons, to-wit,
