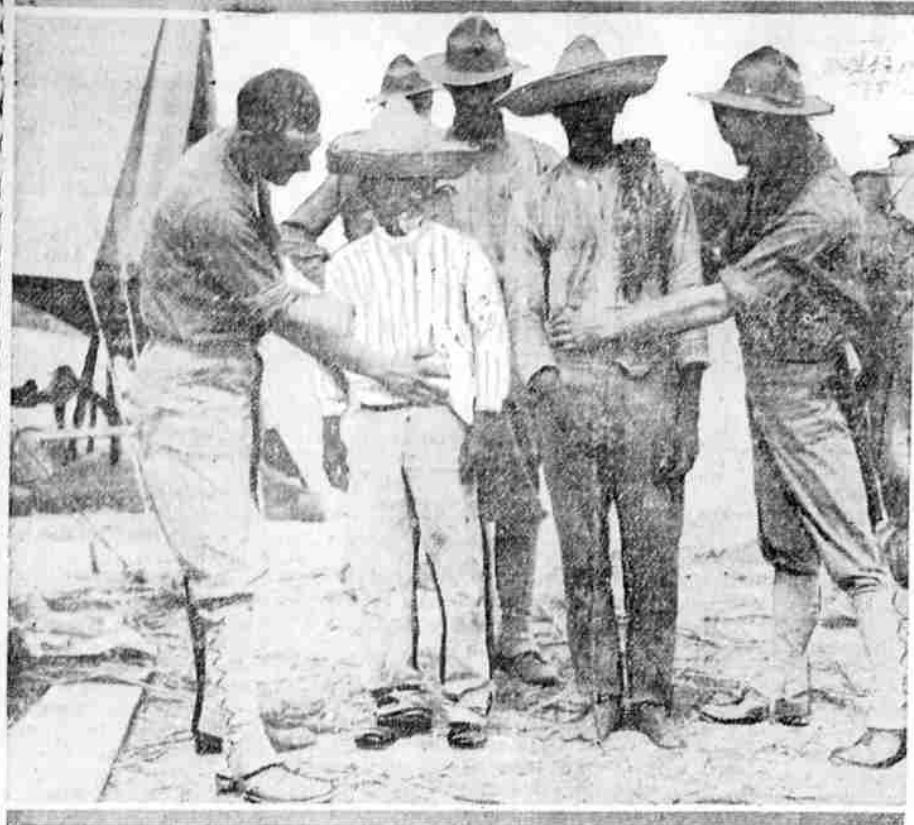

To R. Rauch and H. E. Ferchen, two of the defendants above named: **IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON,** you are hereby required to appear and answer to plaintiff's complaint against you now on file in the above named court and cause on or before the last day of the time prescribed in the order for publication of this summons, to-wit,

on or before the 23rd day of August, 1915, said date being the expiration of six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, the time prescribed for publication being once a week for six weeks.
