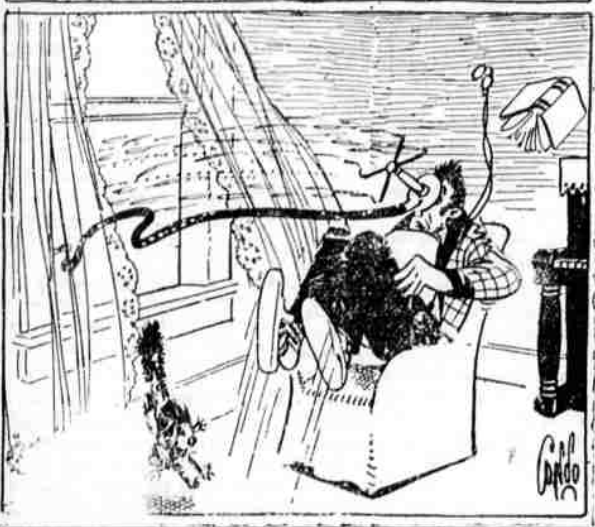
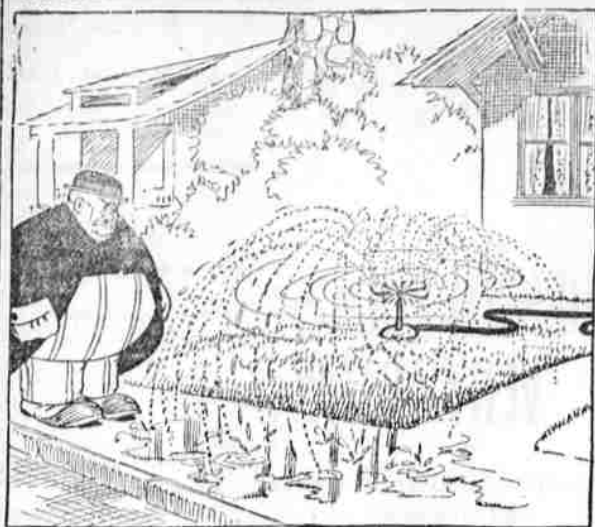


OUTBURSTS OF EVERETT TRUE—BY C. N. D.

"MILITARISM NEVER," SAYS WOOD, "BUT PREPAREDNESS AT ONCE"

PLATTSBURG, N. Y., Aug. 21—In an address to the business and professional men attending the military instruction camp here, General Leonard Wood last night advocated the immediate organization of the material military resources of the country.

"We must be careful," he advised, "not to make the impression that we are trying to create a system of militarism in this country. Militarism we must never brook. We want people from all walks of life in our country at these camps.

"The chief criticism of this movement," he continued, "is made by fakery who do not care to place their own precious bodies in jeopardy."

SUMMONS.

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Douglas County. E. L. Giles, S. C. Miller, George E. Houck, W. L. Cobb, W. S. Hamilton and Thomas Cobb, Plaintiffs, vs.

E. L. Westfall, J. H. Kerr, R. Rauch, J. J. Betts, H. E. Ferchen and J. E. Johnson, Defendants.

To R. Rauch and H. E. Ferchen, two of the defendants above named: IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON, you are hereby required to appear and answer to plaintiff's complaint against you now on file in the above named court and cause on or before the last day of the time prescribed in the order of publication of this summons, to-wit, on or before the 23rd day of Aug-

ust, 1915, said date being the expiration of six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, the time prescribed for publication being once a week for six weeks.
