HIGH SCHOOL IS WELL ORGANIZED

With the second week of school finished Principal Fitzpatrick, of the local high school stated this morning that all the departments are in splendid working order and that the classes are all well organized and progressing rapidly in the work of the first term. Every room in the Lane school building is now occupied by the high school and still there is a shortage of room.

The Freshman class this year, according to Mr. Fitzpatrick is by far the largest in the history of the high school there being 75 freshmen already enrolled and still more to come next week.

One of the interesting features of the work selected by the general class of students is the fact that nearly all of them are arranging their courses and selecting such subjects as will best fit them for entrance into college or for some definite line of work after they have finished high school.

The statistics of high school students kept in the past years show that today 50 per cent more of the graduates of the high schools attend college or university than did a few years ago.

UP FROM THE DEPTHS.

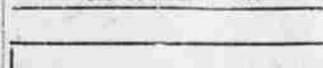

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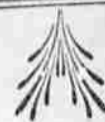
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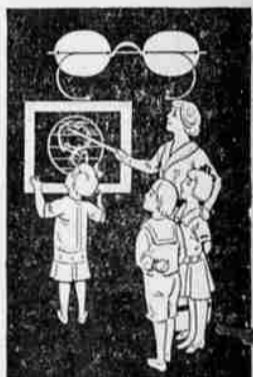


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
