This year a dump for screening the gravel in the pit was built with the result that teams could be loaded in a few minutes with scrapers. This also does away with the old way of hauling coarse gravel on the road, paying for it and then hiring men to rake it out of the road.

We hope to give a more detailed report later. Shall we have a hard-surface road to the coast? We need a market for perishable fruits, poultry products, etc. We would also like to save about 42c per hundred pounds on our sugar by bringing it direct from the coast.
