

**MEDAL ON DISPLAY**

OREGON BUILDING, San Francisco, Cal., Sept. 29.—There now hangs in the Oregon section at the Palace of Horticulture an eighteen-inch orange ribbon with a large rosette at the top and gold braid at the bottom, gold lettering, a silver medal, and a score of names above pretentious titles, proclaiming that the Oregon horticultural exhibit is the "best, most complete, and most attractive installation" at the Panama-Pacific exposition. Each of the nine exhibit passages has one of these ribbons, and it hangs at the best exhibit in that particular palace. This is the highest honor that can be awarded, and in the case of Oregon this award means more than to any other, for Oregon landed this coveted ribbon with what is, in comparison, an almost insignificant exhibit in point of size. The actual fact is that Oregon sent the least here with which to make an exhibit; and but for the liberality in making the very most of the least, Oregon would have been lost in the shuffle. As it is, Oregonians pass along and very properly swell up and push out their chests, but they ought to go home prepared to insist that Oregon never again put it up to a chief of horticulture to make a winning exhibit with so little co-operation as was given to make this one. Hood River and the Rogue River valleys have really done it all so far as horticulture is concerned. The Willamette valley has an insignificant showing though it grows some of the finest fruit to be found on the coast. The Umpqua Valley, especially favored for fruit, sent nothing, and the offerings from other sections than the two named have been insignificant in quantity and usually in general worth—yet they "knew much fine fruit. But "we should worry"—the ribbon hangs there and all Oregon gets the benefit. The award was made some time ago, but the ribbon just now delivered.

**CROP CONDITIONS.**

PORTLAND, Sept. 29.—Following is a summary of the crop conditions in Oregon for the week ending September 28, 1915, as reported to the local office of the weather bureau by special correspondents throughout the state:

Although showers fell in the western counties on the 23rd, 24th, and 27th, and in some limited areas of north-central Oregon on the 24th which benefitted pastures and gardens to some extent, there is still need for rain in all portions of the state. The warm weather has been favorable for the maturing of fruit and garden truck. The picking and drying of prunes has been about completed and the harvesting of apples and pears has begun. In the eastern Oregon valleys the peach crop was very heavy and the quality excellent, but owing to an over-supplied market many tons of the choicest fruit are going to waste. Threshing has been practically completed, and the farmers are preparing the soil for seeding, but little wheat will be sown until the fall rains have commenced. While waiting for the rain, the ranchers are hauling their wood and winter's supplies. Irrigated crops of alfalfa are very good, and the third crop is being put up in some sections. Tomatoes and plentiful are of excellent quality. Seasonable fruits and vegetables are in the local markets in abundance, and the quality is very good.

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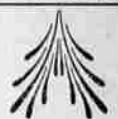
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
