### FREE NO MORE

Under the above heading, the  
Marshfield Record has taken the  
bull by the horns, so to speak, in  
the matter of free publicity, and  
makes the following statement:

"In the past the Record has per-

mitted certain notices to be run free  
of cost, but from and after the first  
of this month notices of every kind  
will be charged for at the rate of  
10 cents a line, straight. This covers

of thanks. There will be no reduc-  
tions of any nature made in the  
price. In years past the Record ran  
many notices gratis, but the requests  
for free space have become so num-  
erous hundreds of dollars annually

tribute its full share, but giving  
away its space has ceased."

### PRESIDENT WILSON'S ENVOY REACHES LONDON

LONDON, Jan. 7.—Being permitted  
to land immediately on arrival  
at Falmouth, Col. E. M. House, per-  
sonal representative of President  
Wilson, reached London yesterday  
and was the guest at breakfast of  
Walter Hines Page, American am-  
bassador.

Colonel House was the only alien  
passenger aboard the steamer Rot-  
terdam.

Colonel House refused to say more  
about his mission than to reiterate  
his announcement that he was look-  
ing over the war situation in Eu-  
rope.

He will spend two weeks in Lon-  
don, departing thence for Paris,  
where he will remain for a few  
days. On his return here he may  
go to Berlin, but this part of his  
itinerary has not yet been arranged.

## SETTLEMENT IS NOW IN SIGHT

Final Phrasing of Lusitania  
Case Only Thing Unsettled.

### RADIO TALKS IN CONGRESS CURBED

Proposed Munition Embargo is  
Denounced by Congressmen—  
Claims "Plunder" Would  
Be Secure in Germany.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—A state-  
ment is expected any hour on the  
Lusitania case, and it is reported  
that the only difference is in phras-  
ing the final agreement. Bernstorff  
is slated to confer with Lansing to-  
morrow afternoon. The cabinet and  
congress both have considered the  
Persia incident. The cabinet listened  
to the scant evidence Lansing  
presented. The foreign committees  
of both the house and the senate  
discussed the matter informally, and  
mapped out a program of co-opera-  
tion with the president and Lansing.  
It is being considered some method  
of putting a quietus on incendiary  
speeches in both houses. The ad-  
ministration says its hands are tied  
because of lack of evidence.

### Committees Adjourn.

The foreign committees of both  
houses adjourned this afternoon  
without having reached any conclu-  
sion regarding the business which  
came before them. This action was  
considered necessary on account of  
the lack of definite information  
which had been presented to the  
members.

The members of the cabinet mani-  
fested impatience over the adjourn-  
ment and one mentioned "broker  
promises" and declared the situation  
called for a "complete round up  
of the whole submarine situation".  
He was unwilling, however, to commit  
himself as to just how this could be  
brought about. After a 15-minute  
conference with Secretary of State  
Lansing, Count von Bernstorff stated  
that he would again confer with  
the secretary tonight, when he be-  
lieved that the difficulties of the  
Lusitania case would be definitely  
settled.

At the first meeting between  
Lansing and von Bernstorff the lat-  
ter presented Lansing with a writ-  
ten statement of Germany's attitude  
on the question of submarine war-  
fare. The contents, however, were  
not made public.

### Embargo Denounced in Congress.

Representative Gardner, of Massa-  
chusetts, denounced in the house  
of representatives today, the proposed  
embargo of war munitions consigned  
to the allies.

This act, Gardner declared would  
"tie the hands of the allies and  
leave the plunder secure in the  
hands of Germany, which would en-  
courage pillage, savagery and infidel-  
ity."

Representative Cooper replied to  
the speech of Gardner and branded  
it as being as violently "anti-German  
as any which one would expect to  
hear in the house of commons in  
England".
