ITALIAN SOLDIERS HAD FINE XMAS

Hot Dinners Served in Steam
Heated Trenches.

ALL CLASSES MADE BIG DONATIONS

Candies and Chocolate Were Favorite Gifts With Tobacco and Cigars a Very Close Second.

ROME, Dec. 26.—(By mail.)—Italy's boys in the trenches had a royal Christmas. Best of all their Christmas gifts was Christmas dinner in steam heated trenches. With their modern trench improvements they had the best of it over some of the girls they left behind. For sunny Italy has the coldest interiors and the poorest heating facilities in all the world. In the trenches, however, up where the snow is heavy and the rains are freezing in the mountains, the steam heated trenches are driving away the terrors of a winter campaign.

The sending of gifts to soldiers at the front was one of the most touching of all Christmas activities. Everyone wanted to send something. A poorly clad woman entered one of the stations where special boxes of sweets, ready for sending to soldiers, were on sale. She had only sixteen cents. The boxes were one franc fifty.

"I'll buy something," she said. "I've no one at the front now. My boy's fallen at Cold Lans, but I want to send some little comfort to some other mother's boy." She bought a small package of sweets for sixteen cents and some mother's boy must have felt a different quality in that dearly purchased remembrance.

The order that chocolate and sweets could not be sent privately to soldiers at the front caused such a wail that parliament decided to change the order. The order had been given because of the fear that poisoned sweets from suspicious and concealed quarters might reach the soldiers. Enough evidence had come to the ears of the authorities to warrant this action. It was this same fear that resulted in the public cigar and cigaret collection stations being abandoned. The opportunity for enemies sending poisoned cigars or cigarettes offered too strong a temptation to evil minds.

The discovery of poisoned tobacco brought the decisive order. Thousands of cigars were destroyed and the order was that thenceforth only money would be accepted to buy cigars from government supply stores. At Christmas time the bars were down for chocolate and sweets. In the face of Christmas sentiment, wives and children, law and precaution stepped aside. And the rush of bundles of candy and chocolate, of tobacco and all sorts of presents, has appalled the postal clerks.

ENTIRE SUBMARINE QUESTION SETTLED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Secretary Lansing has made public the German note of November 20, on the sinking of the Frye, and it revealed a complete agreement with the American position. Germany specifically agrees that passengers shall not be put to sea in small boats unless the sea is calm, and land near. There is no authority for the statement that the administration will not insist unequivocally upon the disavowal of the sinking of the steamship Lusitania.

It is considered possible, however, by government officials that Germany's promise of reparation will be considered sufficient along this line and the matter of disavowal will not be insisted upon. The failure of Germany and Austria to receive the report of the sinking of the Persia leads to the belief that the real cause of the disaster may never be known.

A complete and final settlement of the entire submarine controversy is to all appearances about to be settled to the complete satisfaction of this country and without the severance of any friendly relations, as seemed quite likely at one time. The financial settlement for the Lusitania and the Persia are the matters of chief consideration at the present time, and these are merely matters of detail and will be settled in a very short time.

OBITUARY.

Daniel W. Scott was born March 29, 1843, at Jacksonville, Ill., and grew to manhood near the same city. He enlisted in Co. B, 10th Illinois volunteer infantry, and served in same company three years and 11 months.

He and his wife moved to Roseburg, Oregon, from Kansas, in November, 1913, where he lived until his death on the 13th of December, 1915, at the age of 72 years, 8 months and 13 days. His remains were interred in the Oregon Soldiers' Home Cemetery. He leaves a wife, daughter and a grandchild to mourn his loss.

BERLIN, Jan. 8.—(via Sayville by wireless.)—An Athens report to the German capital stated that the Anglo-French troops occupied the Greek island of Miles and that the inhabitants were highly indignant over the open insult to their government.

CHINESE EMPEROR HAS RESIGNED

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 8.—A Hongkong cable from the China World stated that Yuan Shi Kai has conditionally resigned the emperorship and has appointed Luk Ching Tseng, premier secretary of foreign affairs, to take charge of all government affairs. The story is said to infer that Yuan intends to remain in power until April when the new cabinet proclaims a successor to himself. This cabinet is a holdover one from the old monarchy, and is considered friendly to the self-styled emperor.

Local Chinese said that Yuan's action is taken to stem the tide of rebellion which is getting beyond his control, and his idea is still to remain in power, although he is technically out, Yuan confidently believes that he will be returned to power and the emperorship in April.
