CHICAGO, Jan. 11.—Although Joe Tinker, new manager of the Cubs, has 54 players, including his ex-Whales, there is one other player he would like to add to his string—Steve Yerkes, the old Boston second baseman, who played with the Pitts last season.

Tinker insists that Yerkes was by far the best second baseman in the Federal league.

"Yerkes is a fine ball player," said Joe, "he is a big strapping fellow with a strong pair of hands and a powerful arm. He is not a flashy player, but is consistent and knows what to do at the right time. If we get Yerkes we will have the strongest infield in the National league."
