13 PERISH WHEN BRITISH STEAMER IS SUNK

LONDON, Jan. 11.—Thirteen lives were lost today when the steamer Clan McFarlane was torpedoed and sunk by a submarine. Twenty four others were rescued, according to an announcement made by the admiralty office.

ENGLISH MARCH TO RELIEVE CITY

LONDON, Jan. 11.—The British expedition which was sent to the relief of the beleaguered city of Kutel Amara is now reported to be within 17 miles of the place.

It is stated that the Turks, who outnumber the relief force fully two to one, are blocking the path of the advancing army and that they surround the town on all sides.

Since the dispatches told of the danger of the British since the fighting of last Saturday no news of the fate of the garrison which is defending the town, has been received by the war office here. It is considered quite likely that a decisive battle has already been fought, but on account of the inaccessible region no way has been found to send in reports of the conflict.

A report which has been circulated on the streets of this city and given some credence, is to the effect that the relief forces under Generals Aylmer and Campbell, are fighting the Turks at the bend of the Tigris river. Weather conditions are seriously hampering the progress of the British who must cut their way through heavy forces of Moslems. Kutel Amara is reported to be provisionally sufficiently to withstand a long siege on account of the fact that it served as a base of operations against the recent Baghdad sally.
