

FORMER ATTORNEY GENERAL CRAWFORD IN THE CITY

A. M. Crawford, late attorney general of the state of Oregon, arrived in Roseburg this morning from Grants Pass, where he has been engaged on legal business. Mr. Crawford was at one time a resident of this county and city, and has many old friends here who were glad to see him again. Mr. Crawford looks well and said he was feeling better than for some years, and is now actively engaged in the practice of law in Portland, where he and his son have established an office. In a short interview with a News representative, during a pleasant social call he made at the office, the former attorney general said that prospects for better business on the western coast seemed to be favorable for this year. Politics, he said, was not rousing much interest this far, except in a mere local way, and what there is has been confined more to the republicans, evidencing more interest on their part than on that of democrats. On having it suggested to him that it looked as though Portland was trying to "hog" all the delegates at large to the Chicago convention, he thought it more individual effort than any preconceived plan, and that the other parts of the state would surely get recognition. Mr. Crawford left on the afternoon train for the north and will stop at Salem on some business matters.
