BOTH PARTIES WILL SELECT CANDIDATE

Progressives Hope They May Head the Ticket With Nominee of Republicans.

CHICAGO, Jan. 13.—The progressive national committee is making arrangements for the party's national convention, which, it was decided late yesterday, will be held in this city on June 7, concurrently with the republican convention, in the hope, it is said, that both parties may nominate the same candidate for president.

The committee adopted a declaration of principles, in which the administration of President Wilson was criticized for its failure to deal adequately with national honor and industrial welfare, and the progressive party went on record as favoring a complete preparedness consisting of military armament, as well as mobilization of all the country's resources.

Progressive leaders declared that there would be no amalgamation with the republican party, even in the event that both parties chose the same presidential candidate. The progressive party plans to nominate a national ticket at its convention in June.

Many of the party leaders declared that if the republicans would nominate Colonel Roosevelt or any other man who is regarded as unobjectionable, and would incorporate in their platform the salient features of the progressive principles, both parties would unite on the same candidate in Chicago next June.

No Overtures From G. O. P.

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—Charles D. Hilles, chairman of the republican national committee, declares that no overtures have been made to the progressives by the republicans and that no conferences have been held to consider an amalgamation of the two parties. He said the republicans intend to nominate a candidate they hope "will have the support of the entire electorate."

U. S. TO BE FINANCIALLY STRONG WHEN WAR ENDS

Southern Pacific's President Says Roads Need Increased Earnings Badly.

PORTLAND, Jan. 13.—In a general review of business conditions throughout the country, President William Sproule, of the Southern Pacific Company, upon his return from a month's visit in New York, predicted that when the war is over the United States will find itself in a strengthened condition commercially and financially with respect to the rest of the world. President Sproule said in part:

"An important part of the improvement is because of the confidence business derives from the improvement in railroad earnings. These earnings seem to be large only because they follow years of such serious shrinkage in earnings that the contrast becomes striking. NEW TRIAL FOR SCHMIDT ASKED

Counsel-Alleges 45 Minutes Not Sufficient Time to Consider Verdict in Murder Case.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 13.—Alleging that the jury which convicted Matthew A. Schmidt had not properly conducted itself and that the 45-minute period in which it decided Schmidt was guilty of first degree murder was not sufficient to permit careful consideration of evidence or judges instructions. Nathan Coglan, chief counsel for the defense, demanded a new trial for the prisoner. Schmidt was convicted as an accomplice of James B. McNamara in the dynamiting of the Times building here five years ago.

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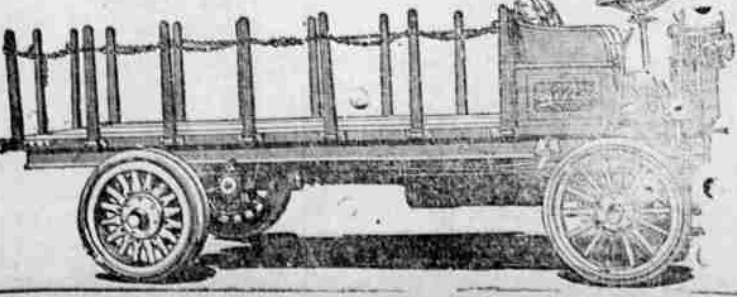
