### AUSPLUND SENTENCED TO FROM ONE TO 15 YEARS

PORTLAND, Jan. 13.—For performing an illegal operation which caused the death of Miss Anna Anderson in his office October 15, Dr. A. A. Ausplund was sentenced yesterday to serve from one to 15 years in the penitentiary. Judge Kavanaugh gave no consideration to a statement signed by nine of the jurors that they never would have found him guilty had they not believed that a parole would be issued.

### 12 ZEPPELIN RAIDS UPON LONDON REPULSED BY BRITISH

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—Twelve attempted raids on London by Zeppelins during December were repulsed by the British, chiefly through large fleets of aeroplanes, and three of the German aircraft were destroyed or captured, according to Dr. W. H. Vincent, of the colonial medical corps, who arrived on the American liner Philadelphia.

"The real reason why Zeppelins have not been able to bombard London or its suburbs since October 14 last," said Dr. Vincent, "is because the British have established an efficient defense against the German air raiders. During December there were twelve separate attempts by Zeppelins to reach London. From two to four Zeppelins participated in each attempt."
