**FIRE APPARATUS
 DEMONSTRATED**

In order to test out the theory that a three quarter inch nozzle would supply a stream sufficient to insure protection from fire to any part of the city, several of the members of the fire department tried out the apparatus under working conditions. When attached to the hydrant near the Umpqua hotel it was possible with either nozzle to reach the top of the building, the smaller, however, furnishing a much more powerful stream. On the heights, the difference was much more noticeable, the larger nozzle furnished very little pressure, while with the smaller a good stream was obtained. In case of fire, however, it would be necessary to run two pipes from the hydrant and even with a three quarter inch nozzle it would be almost impossible to throw a stream to the roof of a two-story dwelling house. This test was made at the hydrant on Lane street near the corner of O. P. Coshov.

An inquiry was also made in regard to the pressure which could be maintained high up on the hill, a five thousand gallon tank equipped with an automatic pump furnishing water to Lane street and Miller's addition. It would be possible to obtain a good pressure here, but as water is supplied through a two-inch main the available amount would not be sufficient to use in fire fighting.

"Without question," stated Fire Chief Thornton, "the city needs for its protection a pump which will furnish three or four streams of water under good pressure." The need is not so great in the business district as the pressure there is sufficient, but in the outlying residential districts it is absolutely necessary for the proper protection.

The opinion of all who witnessed the demonstration was that the districts above the level of the business section had almost no protection and that the only way to supply the need was by a combination truck.

"In nine cases out of ten," said Mr. McClintock, chairman of the fire commissioners, "chemical would be used instead of water, but we must be prepared for this one."

BERLIN, Jan. 25.—The British lost 6,000 in killed and wounded when the Turks repulsed their attack at Mesopotamia, the Turkish official statement said.

**GERMAN BIRDMEN
 ARE AGAIN ACTIVE**

LONDON, Jan. 25.—Two German birdmen bombarded Dunkirk this morning, it is officially announced. Later the British airmen shot down a German aviator at Nieuport. The official announcement said that the German air craft had raided Dover on Monday, but the anti-aircraft guns had repulsed the enemy.

THE THREE JUDGMENT BARS

R. E. Jope, pastor of the Christian church, will preach tonight on "Confessing Christ". He spoke last night to a large audience on the subject, "The Three Judgment Bars."

We all expect pay for service. The law of compensation is for all. Everyone must reap his own sowing and must stand before three judgment bars.

First, public opinion. In worldly matters success or failure often depends upon public opinion. This is equally true of the church. A congregation is judged by the lives of its members.

Second, conscience, which is the faculty of passing judgment on one's self. Conscience says do right, but judgment tells what is right. Judgment and conscience must harmonize before there is peace of mind.

Third, the bar of God, who says the soul that sinneth it shall die. If this is not true is any statement of God true? Before Him we must face our own lives and our deeds. Any will depend upon whether we have obeyed or disobeyed his laws. Do you say God is not a loving Father? Could there be a kingdom without law? If there is no penalty the law is of no effect. God will not judge by public opinion or our conscience, but by the Christ. If he never knew you it is your fault. Do you measure up to his standard?
