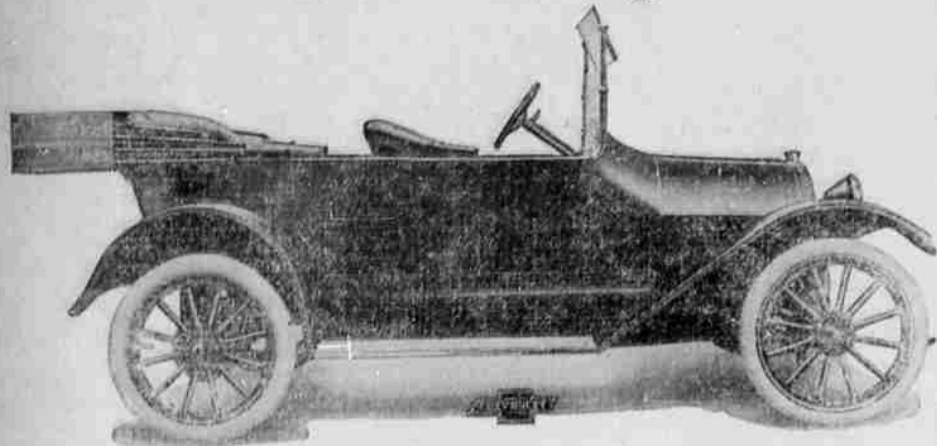

Trial of Mrs. Annie Booth Will Be Called March 6 at Mc-Minnville.

McMINNVILLE, Feb. 19.—William Branson was yesterday sentenced by Judge Delt to life imprisonment for the murder of William Booth near Willamina, October 8, 1915.

The trial of Mrs. Annie Booth, wife of the victim, indicted with Branson for the murder, will be called March 6.

Branson has just passed his majority.
