**MEETINGS FOR MEN ARE WELL ATTENDED**

The Sunday services at the Methodist church were full of interest, and large audiences in attendance. In the morning the pastor preached a powerful sermon on the subject "The Black Line in the Prayer of Moses for a Backslidden People," the application as made in connection with the indifference by the average professed Christian of the present age was very fitting, and should arouse the church not only to her responsibility, but her opportunity as well. At the men's meeting in the afternoon Rabbi Goldman gave a very interesting story of the Hebrew people as they are suffering under the persecution of the Russian and other foreign nations. Using the promise to Abraham as the basis of his statements, he said that the present war was the result of the persecution and murder of the Jewish people, and that as a final result the Turk will be utterly destroyed, and the land of Palestine restored to the children of Israel. He also predicted that the United States had nothing to fear as a result of the present war, as this nation has always been a friend and protector of the Jewish people. After Rabbi Goldman had concluded his address, Rev. Jeffrey spoke for 30 minutes on the theme, "What is Man?" and in a very earnest manner appealed to the men of Roseburg to set up a high standard and live to it, and by so doing help in winning those lost in sin to the Kingdom of Christ. The meetings will continue all this week, commencing promptly at 7:30 each evening. Wednesday evening will be Baptist night, and Rev. Eaton will preach.
