ITALIAN CITY IS RESTORED

Avezzano Destroyed by Earthquake One Year Ago.

IS DUE TO AID OF ITALIAN AMERICANS

Former Sons of City Return and Help Rebuild Old Home—Bring With Them American Spirit And Dollars.

By Henry Wood. AVEZZANO, Italy, Feb. 1.—(By mail.)—Thanks largely to Italian-Americans, Avezzano, which just a year ago today suffered one of the worst earthquake disasters in the history of the world, is today almost a completely restored city.

In just one year as much has been done towards rebuilding this city as has been accomplished at Messina in the ten years that have elapsed since it suffered a similar disaster. In both instances America played a large part in the work of restoration, but at Avezzano American spirit and American influence accomplished miracles which just plain American dollars could not do at Messina.

When a year ago the earthquake reduced Avezzano to a mere mass of ruins, from which only 1,200 people out of a total population of 13,000 escaped, the news struck a responsive chord in the hearts of a particular class of people in America. These were the Italians who themselves in years past had lived in and emigrated from Avezzano or the country immediately around it. Thousands of these persons still had relatives there, and the call of blood as well as the call of the city of their nativity proved stronger than the call of success they were meeting with in their new homes in America.

Almost without exception these former residents of Avezzano abandoned their prospects in America and returned to succor their relatives and help build up the city of their birth. But in coming back to Italy they brought with them more than the few hundred or few thousand dollars that the average Italian immigrant accumulates in America before returning home. They brought with them also the American spirit, American hustle and American tradition. They brought with them especially the remembrance of how San Francisco had risen from its ruins—hundreds of them themselves had gone through the "Frisco" quake—and they set about doing at Avezzano what they had seen Americans do at Frisco. The results have amazed all Italy, and especially Messina, which ten years after its disaster, hardly has begun to be its old self.

Avezzano, whose population was reduced from 13,000 to 1,200 by the quake today has 5,000 inhabitants. Aside from possibly 1,000 of the survivors who remain here, the great bulk of the remainder are returned Italian-Americans. That is why Avezzano is growing faster than a boom town in America.

The government extended the same help to Avezzano that was extended to Messina, but without the Italian-Americans he results would hardly be what they are today. These enterprising hyphenates of which Italy and America both have cause to be proud have carried out the demolition of 3,500 partially wrecked houses, braced up 3,700 tottering walls, constructed barracks and temporary houses that contain 11,800 rooms, while others containing 7,000 more rooms are being constructed, and have repaired 3,600 of the houses not entirely destroyed.

They have got the water works and the electric light plant in full operation, made it possible for the schools to resume sessions, and are laying out new additions to Avezzano with straight streets and regular square blocks, quite after the American fashion of town building and quite contrary to Italian customs where irregular, wandering streets,

and kaleidoscopic blocks are the rule. The Italian-Americans are facing all the civic problems that confront every community in America, and are finding work for the unemployed, encouraging agriculture, providing credit, looking out for public sanitation and caring for the poor. They have in fact, even gone the American towns, where they got their ideas, one better, and when Italy declared war, sent her army a contribution of 380 men, 12 of whom have since been killed, and their places filled by fresh Avezzano recruits.

C. F. HOPKINS FOR DEER CREEK J. P.

CONTEST STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

Claiming the state championship, but refusing to play games seems to be the attitude of the Salem basketball team toward the other teams of the state if their action with the Roseburg squad is taken as an example. At the time Roseburg played at Salem the team there promised a return game for February 25. Now, however, they cancel the date and refuse to play. A telegram sent them a few days ago was answered, stating that they had all dates full and would be unable to play the Roseburg team.

Roseburg has won the undisputed title to the southern Oregon championship and will defend its title in a series of games with some of the Portland teams. At Salem they were defeated on a strange floor and after a long ride, the score then being very close. Roseburg then defeated Corvallis High at Corvallis, also the Agate Freshmen and Monmouth High which is one of the strongest of contenders for state honors.

Salem yesterday officially announced its claim for the state championship and will defend its title in a series of games with some of the Portland teams. The following telegram was sent this morning to the Salem team and on its answer will depend whether or not Roseburg will claim the championship.

Coach Clancy, Salem, Oregon: When Roseburg High met Salem High in Salem, January 25, we at that time secured a promise of a return game to be played in Roseburg about February 25, providing we would guarantee Salem her expenses. We agreed and you promised to cancel or change conflicting dates, Roseburg's only defeat was at Salem, hence, we demand and are entitled to a return game in Roseburg on the dates promised us.

"We will claim state honors for the present equal to yours. Hence, you must come to Roseburg and defend your title or relinquish your claim."

"Roseburg High has recently won in basket ball the undisputed championship of south Oregon. We will challenge you in the Portland papers later."

"We will guarantee Salem High all expenses for seven men for two return games of basket ball to be played in Roseburg Feb. 25 and 26, said amount not to exceed \$100."

"Wire at once, our expense."

"J. LEWIS JOHNSON," "Coach, Roseburg."

At the time Roseburg played at Salem they were given \$25 with which to defray all expenses, leaving them about ten dollars short of enough to meet all expenditures which the team had to meet themselves.

AEROPLANES MAKE SUNDAY RAID OVER ENGLAND

BERLIN, Feb. 21.—German aeroplanes raiding England yesterday, bombed two British tankers, the admiralty announced. The main railway station and docks of Lovestoff were hit repeatedly.

Other German aviators simultaneously raided Furness, Popperinghe, Amiens and Luneville, along the western front, the statement said. It was reported that the British unsuccessfully attacked the Germans occupying the ground recently gained near Ypres. It is also said that the Russian attack at Dvinsk failed.

RUSSIANS TAKE THREE MORE TURKISH CITIES

ROME, Feb. 21.—The Turks are evacuating Bitlis, in Armenia, southwest of lake Van, Petrograd reported. The Russians have followed up the conquest of Mush and Achist, and have occupied all the territory around the lake.

A petition for a county wagon bridge across the county road in line with the road known as the old Roberts creek and Canas valley wagon road near the present Happy Valley ferry was circulated about town today, receiving a large number of signatures. The petition will probably be taken before the county court in a few days.
