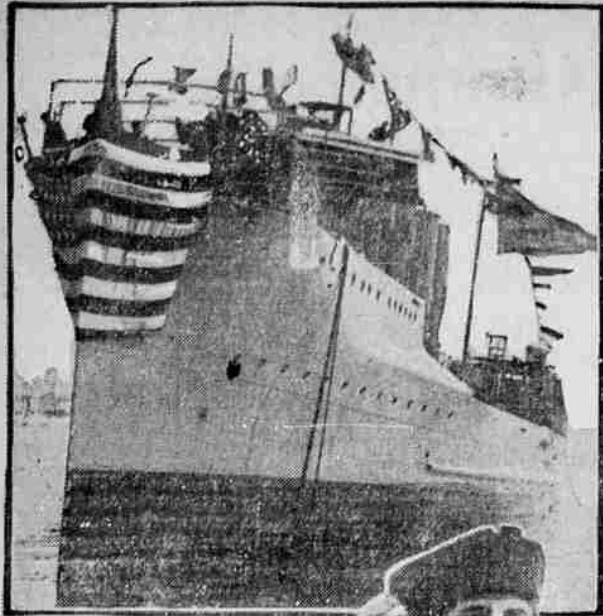


UNCLE SAM LAUNCHES TORPEDO BOAT DESTROYER, NAMED AFTER NAVAL HERO

In the presence of a limited number of invited guests the U. S. torpedo boat destroyer Sampson was launched at Quincy, Mass., a few days ago. Miss Marjorie Sampson Smith, a granddaughter of Admiral W. T. Sampson, hero of the battle of Santiago, acted as sponsor. The ship building company expects to deliver the Sampson to the U. S. government April 1. Her contract speed is 29½ knots. She has a displacement of 1,126 tons and will cost \$795,000.



BENSON SCHOOL TO GIVE EXHIBIT

An art exhibit in which will be shown copies of some of the world's most famous masterpieces will be held at the Benson school building from March 22 to 25, inclusive. A literary, musical and art program will be given on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday nights, a different program being arranged for each evening.

The exhibit is one of more than ordinary interest, consisting of carbon photographs and engravings of more than two hundred art masterpieces, loaned by the Elson Art Publishing Co., of Belmont, Mass. The collection contains only the very best of reproductions of the famous masterpieces of art of various countries and periods. Egyptian, Greek, Roman, Italian, Dutch, French, German, English, Spanish and American are all liberally represented in this large collection of pictures.

In order to see the original pictures which are to be seen a person would have to visit nearly every gallery in the world and even then would not be able to view all of the great masterpieces as some have been destroyed in the great European war.

The art exhibit is given by the schools in order to secure pictures for the beautifying of the school rooms. The money raised from the exhibition is used by the pupils for purchasing pictures, which will go far towards adding to the attractiveness and appearance of the school room.
