

AGED PIONEER PASSES AWAY

Mrs. Mary Brockway, who died yesterday at her home in North Roseburg, is one of Douglas county's oldest pioneers. She was born in Litchfield, Iowa, in the year 1846, moving with her parents when but two years of age to Newburg, Iowa, where she resided until 1862, when she crossed the plains with her parents and settled in Millville, Shasta county, Calif. Two years later the family came to Roseburg where they took up a donation claim. In 1869 she was married to Robert Drew, five children being born to the union, two of whom still survive. They are Mrs. Cnas. Hargan, of Oregon City, and Mrs. W. S. Howard, of Roseburg.

Mr. Drew died in 1880, and she was again married four years later to B. B. Brockway and went with him to Brockway, Ore., where she resided until six years ago, her husband having died in 1905. Mrs. Walter Gordon, of Roseburg; Mrs. Fred Henson, of Othello, Wash., and Chas. Brockway, of Roseburg children by her second marriage also survive to mourn her death, besides one brother, Ed S. Cockerleas, of Roseburg.

The funeral will be held tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock from the Methodist Episcopal church, Rev. Jeffrey officiating. The body will then be taken to the Civil Bend cemetery at Brockway, where it will be interred.

Washington officials stated that in all probability a message would be sent to Carranza today agreeing to the conduct of the operations against Villa hereafter under a protocol.

It is reported that the band of Mormons who were rescued from the danger of Villa showed great joy when their rescuers arrived in sight. Funston reported to Washington today that Pershing reported to him that everywhere he found the natives very friendly and that the Carranza soldiers showed every indication of friendliness.

Additional Troops Asked For.

SAN ANTONIO, March 21.—General Funston announced that he had asked the war department for additional troops, so that he could adequately protect "Pershing's dangerously thin line of communication". Funston refused to make public the number of men he has asked for, preferring to let Washington officials

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AMENDED ARMY BILL PASSED BY HOUSE

WASHINGTON, March 21.—The house amended the Hays army bill, an empowers the president to call out the regular reserves in case of war, or threatened hostilities. The effect of this will be to permit an increase of the regular army to 60,000 men without awaiting congressional action.

The house of representatives today defeated Kahn's short term enlistment amendment to the regular army bill by a vote of 113 to 108. The democrats of the house voted solidly against the bill.
