# HERO OF VERDUN HAS METEORIC RISE IN ARMY

From Colonel to General in  
Eighteen Months.

WAS MAINSPRING IN CHAMPAGNE FIGHTING

Observed Fighting of Verdun From  
Armored Motor Car—Has  
Had 17 Chauffeurs in  
Two Months.

PARIS, March 16.—(By mail.)—General Petain, the defender of Verdun and now in supreme command in that sector, after rising from a colonelship in 18 months, thinks no more of climbing trees, sleeping in a haystack or wading through ice cold water than he does of eating breakfast in the morning. The latest hero of the French army refused to be a hero. He insists upon remaining a plain soldier. He usually makes his headquarters in one of the poorest houses of a war-zone village and instead of the usual flag, sentries and buzzing motor-cars about his front door he stations a couple of men in citizen's clothes to keep off visitors, and lets it go at that.

One of the general's favorite ways of taking observations is to climb to the top of some high tree and see for himself what is going on. He can get to the top of such a tree quicker than any man on his staff. He watched the Verdun fighting in an armored motor car in which he dashed up and down the lines. He has had 17 chauffeurs in two months. He goes so fast he wears them out in a day or so.

Philippe Petain was born April 24, 1856 at Cauchy-la-Tour, Department of the Pas-de-Calais, or near the English channel. His career was not brilliant, though he was an honor man of his class at the war college, for he was not made a colonel until he was 55 years of age. This was his grade when the war came on and brought to light his real military value.

Thirty days after hostilities began he was brigadier general and three days more saw him acting general of division, to which grade he was advanced a few days later. The three stars of a corps commander were given him October 25 when he went to the head of the 23rd which was to cover itself with glory at Crecy, Notre-Dame-de-Lorette and Abain, in Artois.

In April, 1916, he was acting commander of the second army and in June the title became permanent. He was one of the main springs in the Champagne fighting.

General Petain, soon to be 60 years old, a colonel less than two years ago, has won his way considerably on merit. He has never had a "pull," as proved by the fact that when the war began he was on the point of retiring from the army with a low rank for a continental army man.
