The words of this beautiful hymn were written by Cardinal Newman and published anonymously, in 1832, in the "British Magazine." John B. Dykes composed the music, and both words and music are known and loved wherever the English language is spoken. Cardinal Newman was for many years a priest of the Catholic Church in England, being made a Cardinal in 1879. He will long be remembered for his masterful defense of his faith in a controversy with the great Gladstone, known at the time as "the battle of the giants." His whole life was one of sincerity and saintliness, and his memory will always be revered by his countrymen. He died in 1890.

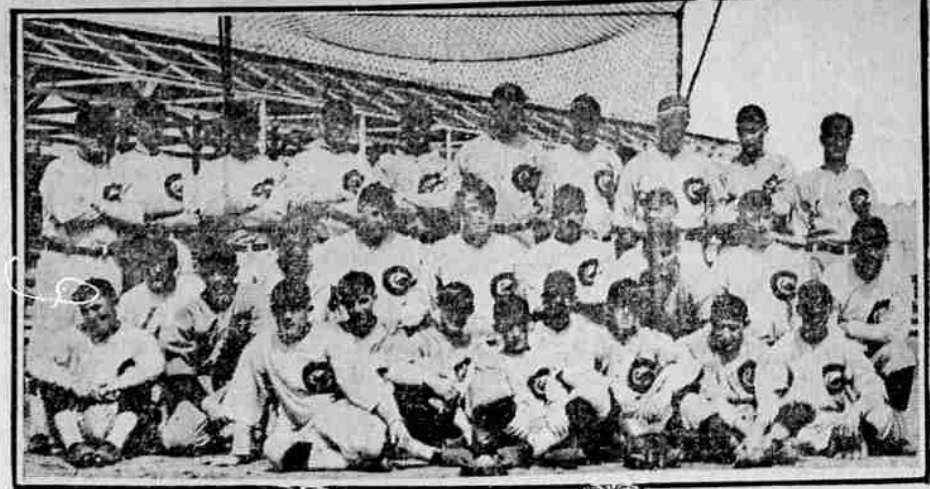
