MANY REQUESTS TO COMMERCIAL CLUB

Tuesday's mail at the Commercial club was varied and interesting. There were three letters asking for names and addresses from lists of inquiries published a few days previous, one coming from Illinois and one from Washington. Three eastern parties wrote asking for literature describing the resources of the Umpqua valley, and signifying their interest in our community.

A lady in Dayton wrote asking for information about the concrete public drinking fountains used here, and asked for plans and specifications. An invitation was received by the secretary inviting him to be present at the meeting of the Pacific Coast Ad. Men's Association. Two contractors wrote saying that they intended submitting bids on the new federal building, and asking that material men here and dealers in building supplies correspond with them.

The Poster Advertising Association stated that through the courtesy of C. L. Bargar, of the Umpqua Advertising Agency, The Poster, a beautifully illustrated magazine would come to the club for a year. A gentleman in Monmouth wrote asking when the Strawberry Carnival would be held, as he intended to be present, never having missed one since the first.

A party in Ashland asked that he be furnished with the names of all inquirers from Virginia, reason not given. The Real Estate Directory wrote asking that they be furnished with the names of all real estate firms and abstract companies in the city. The Caribbean Syndicate, a New York firm, asked that they be furnished with the names of all shippers of food stuffs for export, stating that their market was in Central America, and was eager for American fruits, and other food products.

One application for membership was also received in this mail. A Portland commission firm wished the names of all strawberry growers who shipped to the Portland market, and further said that they wished to buy all of the Douglas county early strawberries they could get.

Representative Hawley wrote saying that 50 bulletins on the production of Sudan grass, would be mailed in a day or two.

How is that for variety? Of course the range covered by these letters was greater than usual, but it is not unusual for 15 to 25 letters to be received at the Commercial club in a day.

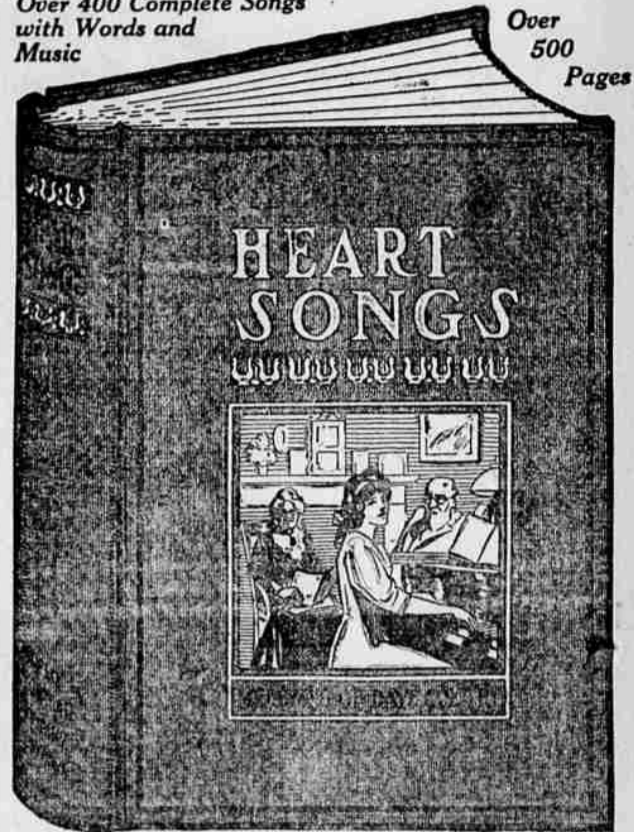
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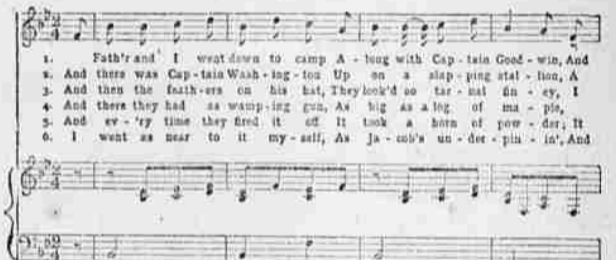

Yankee Doodle



(Found on page 382, "Heart Songs.")

"Yankee Doodle" is the earliest American song dedicated to national use. The tune originated in France or Holland, and was first sung in England to an old nursery rhyme. The cavaliers later sang it in ridicule of Cromwell, who entered Oxford riding a small horse, and wearing a single plume—fastened to a knot called, derisively, a "macaroni." In the summer of 1775 the English army lay encamped near Albany, awaiting the arrival of the native militia before marching on Ticonderoga.

The green Yankee recruits poured into camp, each man armed and equipped in his own fashion. The British officers chose to regard their allies much in the light of a joke, and one of their number dedicated to the raw militia the tune of "Yankee Doodle" fitted with words for the occasion.
