NEBRASKA IS WEARY OF BRYAN

OMAHA, April 21.—The Bryan family faction in Nebraska politics was completely wiped out in the primaries this week. William J. Bryan stands defeated at every turn by heavy majorities and even though he received a proxy by some other state as a delegate to the Democratic National convention at St. Louis, he will have small influence in that meeting, since his own state has repudiated him so definitely.

Although no particular effort was made in the primary to defeat Bryan as delegate-at-large, Nebraska voters of whom he was once the idol, turned against him of their own accord and defeated him decisively. Not only did they defeat Bryan himself, but they turned down the friends for which he made 100 speeches in defeated his new pet, prohibition, for which he made 100 speeches in three weeks.

In his own city of Lincoln, Chas. W. Bryan, W. J. Bryan's brother, was defeated by 10,000 by Neville, the "wet" candidate for governor. Charles Bryan was elected mayor of Lincoln only a year ago. That Lincoln voters have grown tired of his administration is shown by the result of the vote in that city.

That the entire state has grown weary of the dictatorial manner and the rids of the older Bryan, is indicated by the results of the vote, in which William J. Bryan was concerned. Mr. Bryan stands sixth in a list of seven candidates for delegate-at-large. Mr. Bryan's latest in-

consistency was the making of prohibition his chief issue and then having all the members of his slate, except his brother, well known "wet" men.

Two of the Bryan "wet" prohibitionists were elected delegates-at-large, but the Bryan family today stands completely eliminated from Nebraska politics. Even should Mr. Bryan manage to squeeze in as a delegate to the convention, his escape from defeat will have been so narrow as to discredit him.

Bryan made a tremendous effort to defeat Senator Hitchcock for re-nomination, but Hitchcock's majority over Bryan's candidate is more than two to one. Returns indicate that John L. Kennedy will be the Republican nominee for senator.

The latest returns give Henry Ford a lead of 1000 over Albert B. Cummins for the Republican presidential nomination. Charles E. Hughes is third.

LAWRENCE TO BOTTLE JUICE OF LOGANBERRY

If Proven a Success Many More Acres Will be Used.

EXCELLENT FLAVOR IN UMPQUA BERRIES

Commercial Club To Help Secure Pickle and Canning Factory—Small Quantity Flax Seed Available.

It has been reported to the Commercial club by the manager of Sunshine ranch, that some interesting experimental work is being done along agricultural lines by this progressive grower. Eighteen acres of loganberries have been set out which are now two years old, and have been trellised, and which are expected to produce a considerable crop this year. Mr. Lawrence will extract and bottle the juice for the market and this will be done under the supervision of the extension department of the Agricultural college at Corvallis. This will be the first time loganberry juice has been manufactured commercially in the Umpqua valley, and the experiment will be watched with interest by the industries department of the local Commercial club, as it may be the means of attracting a large extracting and bottling plant for this purpose. It has been demonstrated that loganberries grow splendidly and with an excellent flavor here, and the market is constantly increasing for the bottled product both on this coast and in the eastern markets. The Commercial club is also working on a plan for a canning, pickling and fruit juice manufacturing plant at Roseburg, and the results of this experiment may be one of the means of securing such a plant.

As reported through these columns a week ago, the Roseburg Commercial club has secured enough fiber flax seed for the planting of five acres and this has been allotted to five growers in various parts of the valley. One of these growers is unable to plant his quota this year, so the Commercial club will offer this lot to any farmer of responsibility who will agree to plant and care for it, and furnish the straw so grown for shipment the state flax plant at Salem where it will be retted and scutched and the returns paid to the grower. The grower will be required to pay \$3 for this seed, (one and one-half bushels), in the fall when the crop is gathered. Any one who is interested should call on Secretary Josephson at the Commercial club at once. There is still ample time for this seed to be planted.
