

INTERESTING LETTER ABOUT ROSEBURG, PAST AND FUTURE

Editor News: We wonder if the people of Roseburg, and especially those who are looking forward to the time when this city will have two, three or five times its present population, have ever stopped to consider the fact that Roseburg's trade area, or that area which is available for the purpose of contributing to its development has been constantly shrinking during the last 30 years.

Now all of the commerce from which Roseburg can expect to benefit must originate within a territory which is bounded by the Cascades on the east, the Coast range on west, with perhaps Middle as its southern boundary and 53rd or 60th as its northern limit.

All of these facts go to point out the conclusion that Roseburg in order to justify her growth to the point which every loyal citizen expects her to reach, must make the most of her opportunities which lie at her door and which are tributary to her, as a trading and commercial center.

There is one great resource which stands out before all others both in value and in availability, and that is her tremendous timber supply, which must of necessity be made tributary to this city and contribute to her prosperity and growth.

By constructing a railroad from this city to the confines of the large timber belt to the east of us, they can make certain the erection of a saw mill which will but be the forerunner of many more of the same kind of industries, and will stimulate the construction of other factories using our lumber as a raw material, and furnishing employment for hundreds of our citizens, as well as increasing our population by drawing others from the outside to satisfy the demand for labor which will thereby be created.

Think this matter over and see if you can discover any other opportunity than this one which will be offered to the voters of this city on May 22, to secure the future of Roseburg and that of its citizens.

Notice is hereby given that at a meeting of the Common Council of the city of Roseburg, Oregon, held on the 3rd day of April, 1916, the following resolution was adopted: Resolved that the Common Council deems it expedient and necessary and proposes to improve Second Avenue North from the east line of East Third Street to the east line of East Fourth Street in the following manner: First: By grading the street to the proper sub-grade; Second: By paving the roadway of said street twenty feet in width with concrete pavement; Third: By constructing concrete curbs; Fourth: By constructing sub-drains, if necessary; Fifth: By constructing street monuments; Sixth: By laying vitrified sewer pipe; Seventh: By constructing catch basins and inlets.

The estimate of the City Engineer of the probable detailed cost of said improvement is the sum of \$2312.13. Resolved that the City Recorder be and he is hereby directed to give notice of said proposed improvement as provided by the Charter of the City of Roseburg.

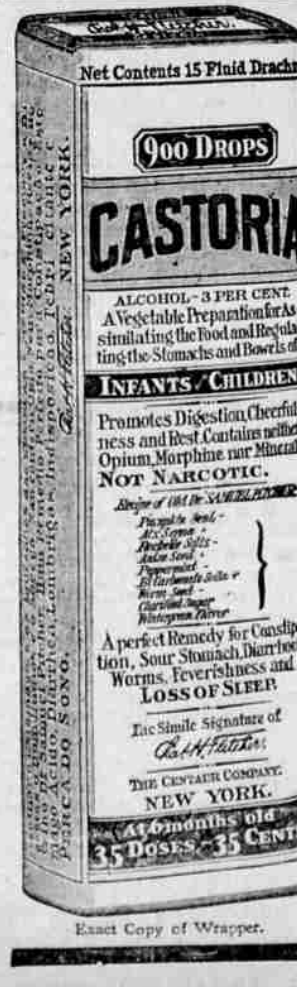

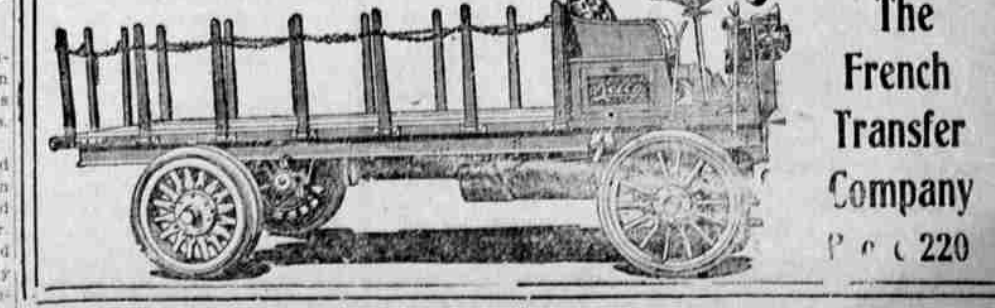
