

HENRY CLAY BARNABEE; MASTER OF MIRTH IN MUSIC

America's master of mirth is the loving title given to Henry Clay Barnabee, known in America and Europe as one of the most active singers of opera roles of his time. He was the original sheriff of Nottingham in "Robin Hood," and played Sir Joseph Porter in "Pinafore" the first time it was presented in America. He was for over sixty years known as the only man who could sing "The Cork Leg" and the ballad "O Loving Heart, Trust On," written for him by Gottschalk, the famous composer. Shortly after the Civil war Mr. Barnabee began playing with the Boston Museum Company and later began his work as an entertainer, making a circuit of minor towns and cities, combining music and declamations. Mr. Barnabee was a leading spirit of the old Boston Ideal Opera Company, which continued for many years as one of the most popular musical organizations ever known to American opera lovers. In later life he retained his splendid quality of voice, still singing many of the songs which he made famous. "O Loving Heart, Trust On," and
