PERMANENT LEAGUE IS ORGANIZED

Friends of President Form Non Partizan Political Club.

L. A. UELAND CHOSEN AS PRESIDENT

Women Are Given Offices and Names Placed on Committees Which Are Appointed by The President.

Thirty prominent Democrats gathered last night at the court house for the purpose of organizing a Woodrow Wilson league. The boys' band had been engaged and played several numbers on the street before going to the court house where the meeting was called to order by Temporary Chairman R. R. Turner. Mr. G. Y. Harry, state organizer of the leagues was then introduced and in a few words explained the purpose of the club.

The movement was first started by a number of Portland men who were friends of the president and desired to see him re-elected. They held a meeting one evening, drew up a constitution and elected officers and in a short time had formed a large club which now numbers 1600 members in Multnomah county. A committee was then appointed to organize branch leagues throughout the state, but on account of the bad weather and the necessary work in circulating the president's nominating petition, nothing has been done until the past few weeks. At the present time the league is contemplating a wide advertising campaign which will set forth the accomplishments of the administration.

Mr. Harry stated in his explanation that the association would have no part in state or county politics, but would confine itself wholly to the work of placing before the people in the doubtful states the value of a democratic administration. It would be its purpose to work for the nomination and election of Woodrow Wilson and to defend and sustain him in his administration. The fact that many Republicans were becoming members of the league was cited by Mr. Harry as a proof that people were breaking away from party politics.

After several leagues have been organized about the state a convention will be held at Portland at which delegates are expected to attend from all the various branches and at this time a state organization will be formed and the work which is now being carried on by the Portland association will be turned over to this body. Mr. Harry urged that the club make an effort to gain women members and that they give programs consisting of music and good speeches, which would prove attractive.

After the reading of the constitution the following officers were elected: L. A. Ueland, president; Mrs. Wm. Bell, vice-president; H. C. Darby, secretary; W. H. Fisher,

treasurer. Mr. Ueland entered immediately upon his duties and in a short speech stated that upon coming to Oregon he had thought to retire from politics. However, as he had been chosen for the office he would do his best for the league and its work. He is an excellent presiding officer and his ability proves that he has had a great deal of experience in this line of work.

The constitution provides for a finance committee but this was left until next meeting. A committee of ten was appointed for membership the committee being G. V. Wimberly, R. R. Turner, Earl Strong, H. M. Pearson, L. F. Reizenstein, T. E. Singleton, Mrs. L. O. Maddux, Miss Blanche Reed, Mrs. W. T. Wright and A. T. Schubert.

Monday, May 3, was chosen for the next meeting and L. F. Reizenstein, R. R. Turner and Wm. Bell were appointed to arrange a program.

POTATOES TO BE INSPECTED HERE

According to a letter received this morning by County Fruit Inspector F. L. Strang from Albert C. Allen, commissioner for the third district of the state board of horticulture, the quarantine against California potatoes has been greatly modified. Heretofore it has been necessary for all California potatoes to be sent to Portland for inspection, but at the present time they may be inspected at Roseburg.

The potatoes are to be examined for all worm and tuber moth and in the latter case they are to be destroyed by burning or shipped back to California or any other point
