RAILROAD MEANS **NEW INDUSTRIES**

The manner in which industries follow the building of a railroad is evidenced in the following clipping from a Portland paper. The propossi for the construction of a rallroad at Grants Pass was almost identical with that to be settled by the Roseburg voters at the election

GRANTS PASS, Or., May 5 .- A lumber planing mill of 60,000 feet capacity, combined with a lumber purchasing agency, is to be estab-lished along the line of the new Twohy railroad in South Grants Pris, according to announcement made here tonight,

The Frank P. Dee Lumber Comsany, of San Francisco, is to put in the new mill. The company is represented in this city by P. J. Bavse, who gave out the information.

A site of seven acres along the new Twohy railroad and the Pacific ignivay has been leased for five cars with an option of purchase. A iding will be built at once and the daning will will be under construcion within 29 days, all the mahinery having been ordered aiready, ir. Savage declares. The company operates a number of plants along he Pacific comt and buys the undressed lumber from the various lo-cal mills, gresses it and ships it east.

The Doe Company contracts with the mills for lumber of No. 2 shop and better, making a constant each market for all lumber of that grade. Contracts have been made with the mills of Schmitt Bres., Harry Smith and McCatto & Christie for their en-

but of the higher grades of umber. This new industry, together with the mills already in operation, will make a payroll of 400 to 500 men tale sammer in the lyints Pass district.

COUER D'ALENE MINERS GET \$125,000 IN BOLD BONUSES

WALLACE, Idaho, May 11-Nearly \$125,000 in gold was received here today to be distributed among 4000 miners in the Couer d'Alene district as a bonus for their work during the month of April. The bonus for each miner amounts to shout \$1 a day.

The bonus system, adopted by the mine operators February 1, is governed by the prices of the metals produced-mostly gold, copper and For March the miners received 75 cents a day bonus.

Merchants throughout the mining district report that business has practically doubled since the inauguration of the bonus system.
