FIRE TRUCK HINDERED
BY RACING AUTOS

In going to the fire at the Soldiers Home yesterday, the driver of the fire truck was seriously hindered in making time on account of several other autos being driven ahead of the fire truck, raising a cloud of dust, so that the driver of the fire truck could hardly see the road. Complaint is also made that several persons, who do not belong to the fire department, undertook to ride on the fire truck, leaving little room for the regular firemen.

An ordinance covering these matters will be introduced and passed at the regular meeting of the council next Monday evening, but in the interval, let it be understood that the fire truck, or other conveyances carrying firemen must have the right of way, and no one but members of the fire department will be allowed to ride on the fire truck. I wish to call attention to drivers of all automobiles to the present ordinance governing the speed at which such cars can be driven, and there is no provision permitting excessive speeding in going to the scene of a fire, and hereafter all violators of said ordinance will be arrested and brought before the city recorder for trial.
