STUDENT'S BODY FOUND AT LAST

EUGENE, Or., May 19.—The body of Owen Whallon, a senior at the University of Oregon, who was drowned in the Willamette river April 30, was recovered yesterday by fishermen.

Whallon, who was a son of C. V. Whallon, of Nampa, Idaho, lost his life when a canoe in which he was riding with companions capsized.

The three other members of the party escaped with their lives after floating down stream for more than a mile.

For days the University of Oregon students patrolled the banks of the river in a vain search to find the body. Dynamiting was resorted to in an effort to bring it to the surface. A reward of \$25 also was offered for its recovery.

Coroner Veatch is holding the body awaiting directions from the boy's father.

FORMER ROSEBURG MAN IN FRISCO STRIKE

According to word received in this city this morning Walter Rime, who left here a few days ago to accept a position in the ship yards at San Francisco is in the midst of a heated strike. He has accepted a position as boiler maker and now 1000 of them have been forced to quit because of the fact that the laborers, rivet heaters and passerboys have gone on a strike and tied up the works.

Five hundred men have laid down their tools and quit work demanding an increase in pay of from \$2.25 to \$2.75 and \$3.00. Unless the strike is settled immediately the mechanics are also planning to walk out. At the present time, 1000 men have quit, while 1000 more are unable to carry on their duties for the lack of assistants.

RELATIVE OF ROSEBURG WOMEN KILLS SELF

SALEM, May 18.—Phillip Reese, a well to do farmer residing five miles south of Salem on the Jefferson road, killed himself today by cutting his throat with a razor. Reese was 76 years old and his act is believed to have been due to despondency, because of ill health.

Last January Reese was kicked by a horse, sustaining a broken arm. He killed himself on the porch of his home where he was found by members of the family. A widow, two step-daughters and a son survive him. The son resides in California and the others on the farm near Salem.

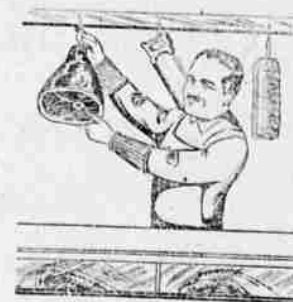
