"THE PRICE OF POWER" STIRRING LABOR PLAY

Coming Triangle Feature Shows Cotton Mill in Operation—Has Absorbing Love Interest.

A remarkable play is "The Price of Power," the Fine Arts-Triangle production, coming to the Antlers Theatre Tuesday and Wednesday. It is full of realism in showing a modern cotton mill in full operation and a strike in which brickbats and clubs figure. There is also a thrilling struggle between a worthless scion of an idle rich woman and a beautiful factory girl. There is such swift action in the play and it is so lightened with touches of humor that any too intensely tragic feature is made endurable and the

whole effect is appealing and worth while.

Orrin Johnson plays with versatility three different roles, representing the same man under different circumstances and at various times in his career. Gladys Brockwell is realistic in her characterization of the factory girl who wins the ambitious young mechanic by her forward appearance and physical charms. Vera Lewis as the wife of the magnate makes clear the shallow, frivolous nature that spoils her son and forgets her husband as soon as he is out of her sight. Spottiswoode Aitken is cast as the aged father of a working girl. He shows the fiery spirit of the old workman, who stirs up the men to strike in spite of his daughter's appeals.

FORECAST FOR WEEK BEGINNING SUNDAY, MAY 21

WASHINGTON, May 22.—North Atlantic states, partly overcast weather and moderate temperature the first part of the week will be followed by rising temperature and unsettled weather by Tuesday and on Wednesday, and fair weather and mild temperature the remainder of the week. Middle Atlantic states: the week.

Middle Atlantic States: The weather partly cloudy with normal temperatures with a probability of local showers Monday or Tuesday.

South Atlantic and East Gulf States: The weather will be fair with moderate temperatures the first half of the week. During the latter half the weather will be warm with local thunderstorms.

West Gulf States: The weather will be generally fair with normal temperatures during the week.

Ohio Valley and Tennessee: Local showers and thunderstorms the first part of the week will be followed by generally fair weather after Tuesday. Normal temperatures are probable.

Region of the Great Lakes: The weather will be showery and warmer the first half of the week and fair with moderate temperatures the latter half of the week.

Upper Mississippi Valley and Plain States: Local showers at the beginning of the week will be followed by generally fair weather for several days. Temperatures will be considerably higher than the week just passed.

Rocky Mountain and Plateau Regions and Pacific States: The weather will be generally fair except that occasional showers are probable on the North Pacific coast. Temperatures will be near the normal.

LEVI STRICKLAND DIES AT THE SOLDIERS' HOME

Levi Strickland, a member of the Soldiers' Home for the past two years, died after a short illness Saturday morning. Mr. Strickland was born in Walter county, Ill., and during the Civil war served in the 62nd Illinois Infantry, Co. A. He was married in 1870 to Miss Jane Lewis, nine children being born to the union, seven of whom survive. He was a member of the Christian church and a devoted father and husband.

The funeral was held yesterday afternoon from the chapel of the Soldiers' Home, R. E. Jope, pastor of the Christian church officiating. Mr. Strickland has four children residing in this city, Mrs. Sam Thackeray, Chas. Strickland, Seel Strickland, and Mary Mullen. The other children reside in Kansas and were unable to attend the funeral.
