AUSTRIANS ARE DEFEATED IN BIG BATTLE

Complete Rout of Two Brigades is Announced.

OFFICERS OF HIGH RANK ARE CAPTURED

Italians Take Offensive Along the Entire Front, Attacks Are Planned in Conjunction With Russians.

LONDON, June 12.—The Russian embassy today announced the complete rout of the Austrian armies near Czernowitz. Two entire divisions with all the generals, artillery and ammunition were captured. The Russians are still pursuing and the Cossacks are overrunning the territory in the rear of the fleeing armies.

Italians Make Advances.
ROME, June 12.—The Italians today took the offensive along the entire Trentino front, making general advances. The movement will develop into a powerful attack timed simultaneously with the Russian offensive, and the withdrawal of the Austrian troops from Trentino.

Attacks West of Vaux Repulsed.
PARIS, June 12.—Repeated violent attacks by the Germans west of Vaux were completely repulsed, is officially announced. An artillery struggle of the utmost violence is progressing at Souville and Tacennes. West of Soissons, the French artillery has destroyed the German works, one shell causing an explosion within the German line apparently striking an ammunition depot.

Russians Are Repulsed.
BERLIN, June 12.—(via wireless to Sayville.)—An official dispatch states that the Austro-German forces have repulsed a determined attack made by the Russian forces, northwest of Boeracz and that 1,500 prisoners were taken at the time.

OREGON MINIMUM WAGE LAW TO BE REARGUED

WASHINGTON, June 12.—The supreme court today ordered a reargument in the case involving the constitutionality of the Oregon Minimum wage law, which gives the industrial commission the power of fixing minimum wages.

MORE JAP TROOPS FOR CHINA

TOKIO, June 12.—The Japanese government is sending two battalions of troops to Tientsin and Peking, was learned here today.

DESPERATE CONVICT ESCAPES AT SALEM

SALEM, June 11.—Concealing himself beneath the motor truck belonging to the state institution for the feeble-minded, C. H. Drecker, 32, escaped from the Oregon penitentiary Saturday noon. The fact that Drecker had escaped did not become known until Saturday evening when the regular count of the inmates

was taken. Efforts to locate the fugitive, so far have been unavailing.

Drecker is declared to be a desperate character. He was serving a term of from one to 10 years for larceny, having been received at the prison Multnomah county. Drecker served 1915. Prior to his conviction in Multnomah county, Drecker served a term in the prison at San Quentin for embezzlement. This was in 1910.
