MAY MOVE GRANTS PASS SUGAR BEET FACTORY

G. O. Elliott and L. R. Yepsen, Mormon elders who have been in this valley for a short time, express themselves favorably on the sugar beet activities, says the Medford Mail Tribune.

"This valley," said Mr. Elliott, "is the only logical site for a sugar beet factory south of the Sutherland valley. It has acreage enough to support one, and soil to grow the beets. Ten thousand acres, including Sams valley could be secured and would be ample to run a large factory."

"When the sugar beet company was formed Bishop Nibley allowed his name to be used to finance the company, as the others had no standing in the eastern markets, on condition that he be not required to give any actual time."

"The factory at Grants Pass is sure to be moved, probably north to Sutherland or the Willamette valley. There is insufficient sugar beet land around Grants Pass for seventy miles except this valley. The Sutherland

The bids must be accompanied by a certified check for an amount equal to at least ten per cent of the amount bid.

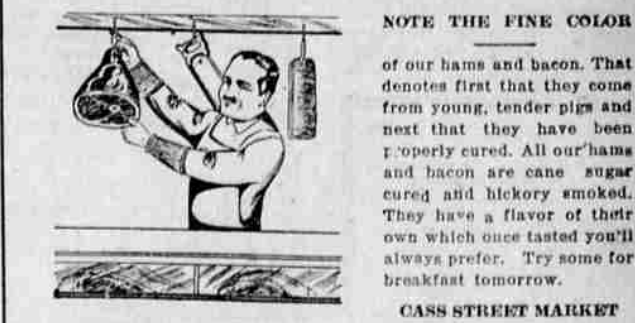
