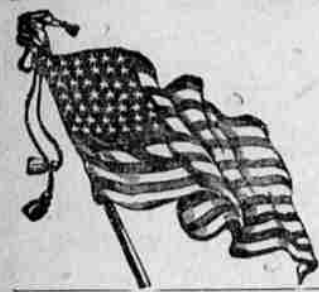

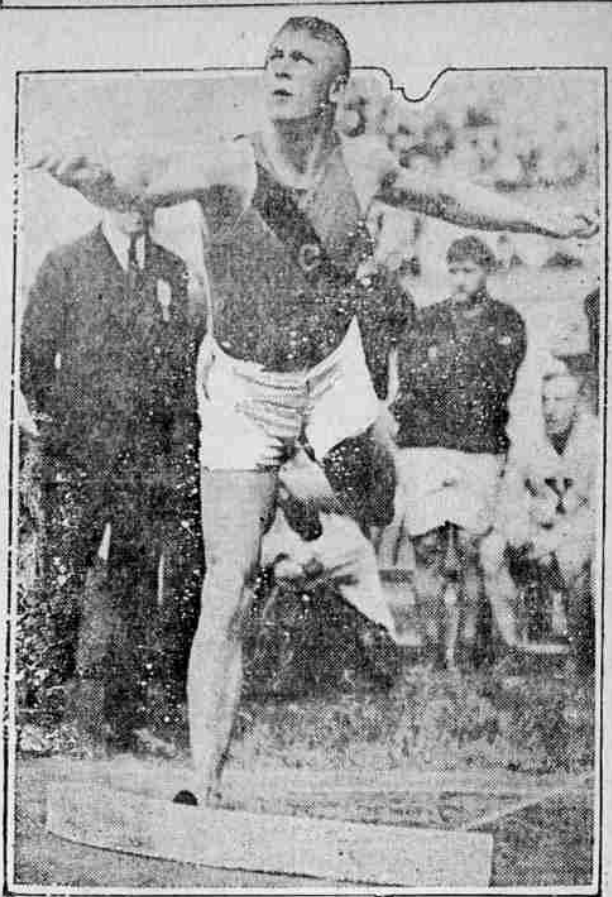
WOMAN DELEGATE AT G. O. P. CONVENTION
