SALEM COMPANY IS THE FIRST TO BE READY

SALEM, June 20.—A demonstration that lasted many minutes took place at the Armory about 8 o'clock last night when Captain Gehlar announced to his 125 men that company M would leave for Clackamas this morning.

Early yesterday Captain Gehlar called up General White in Portland and informed him that company M was ready to leave Salem at a moment's notice.

"You better stay a while longer and recruit to war strength," the general advised.

The recruiting proceeded through the day.

"I have 125 men at the armory ready to entrain," he announced.

"Come whenever you are ready," replied General White.

The captain lined up his men.

"Boys," he said, "we can either leave tomorrow morning and be the first company at Clackamas, or we can wait a day or two and be second or third in the mobilization camp. All who want to go tomorrow morning raise hands."

A double row of hands shot upward.

"All who want to wait, raise hands."

Not a hand was raised.

"Company M will entrain at the Southern Pacific depot at 9:22 o'clock tomorrow morning," came the order from the captain.

Instantly the big drill hall in the Armory was a bedlam of shouts and cheers. It was Salem first—first in the United States—to report ready for mobilization.

The demonstration has probably never been equaled in Salem.

"It was as good as some we read about at Chicago," said Captain Gehlar.

The officers and men of the company are delighted with the support given and confidence shown in them by the people of Salem. The Salem military band has been out

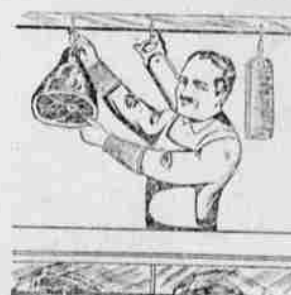
