### ASK SOLDIERS JOBS BE KEPT

SALEM, June 21.—Urging that positions held by members of the Oregon national guard be preserved for them upon their return from the expedition to the Mexican border, if this develops, Governor Withycombe yesterday issued a statement in which he says: "The least that those who do not go can do for those who do go is to assure them that their jobs will be open when they return."

The governor is highly gratified at the preparedness of the Oregon troops and at the readiness to enlist shown by those who have not heretofore been connected with the guard.

He says:  
**Expects Record Work.**  
"I am very gratified at the reports coming in concerning mobilization of the national guard. Everything seems to be moving satisfactorily and I believe the Oregon troops will make a record for getting ready quickly and efficiently."

"I understand that a considerable number of new men are needed. Right here in Salem the company is asking for fifty more men. I am old that ten men enlisted in the first ten minutes, which certainly shows the proper spirit."

**Appeals to Employers.**  
"In this connection there is one important matter which should be placed squarely before the attention of every Oregon employer. The men who enlist and give up their positions should be assured of getting them back when they come home. No only that, but where needs be, I think that employers would do well to help out the families of enlisted men who might need such help. The least that those who do not go can do for those who do go is to assure them that their jobs will be open when they return."

"As for you, be sure I have always loved you and do love you for evermore, whatever happens. Once more I rely on you to be full of courage. From your affectionate husband, who sends to you and his dear boy the warmest embraces."

According to word received in this city this morning from Stebbinger Bros., of Portland, the successful bidders on the federal building, they will be on the ground ready to commence work not later than July 1. A large force of men will be employed on the excavating for the basement

and foundations. That this work will be hurried is shown by the contract for materials as the first load of gravel for the cement base is to be delivered on the 20th of July.

The H. J. Denn Transfer Company has received the contract for the furnishing of the sand, gravel, cement and other materials which will be necessary and are already making preparations to have deliveries made at once. The contractors are expected to be in Roseburg the first of next week to oversee the preparations for active construction.
