Loyal Leaders Club.

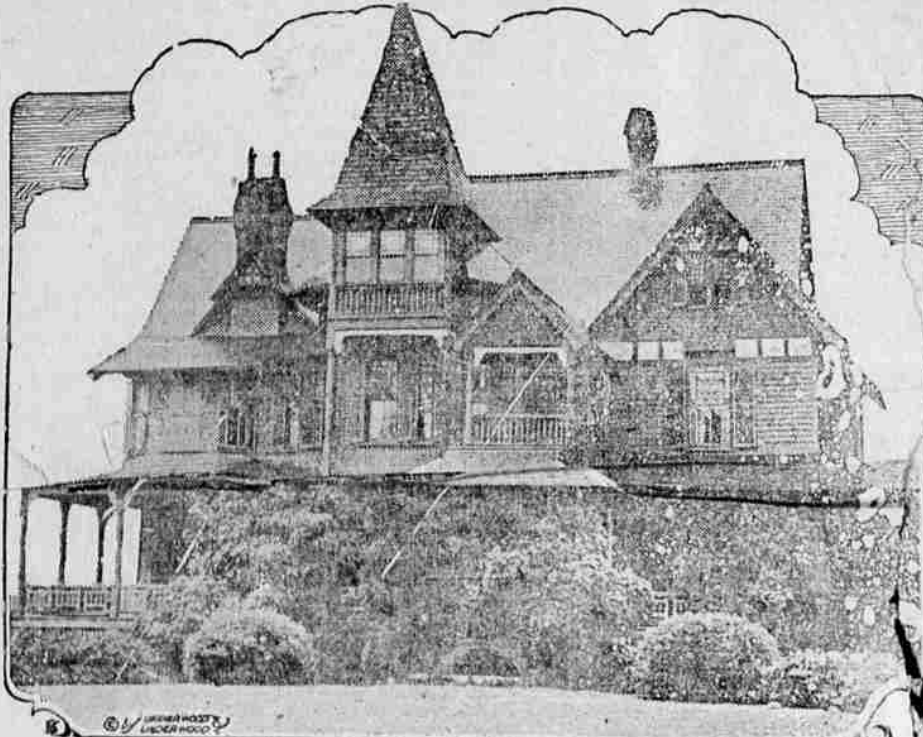

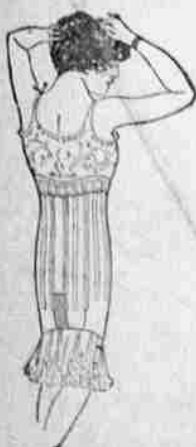
