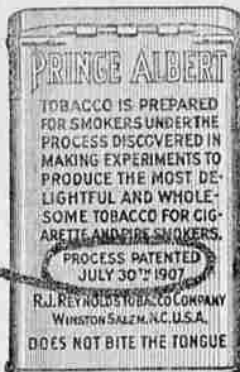

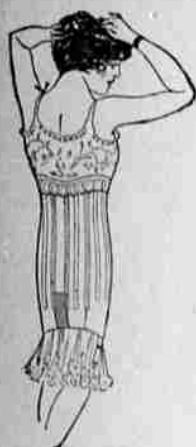

PRISON SHOE FACTORY FOUND UNPROFITABLE

Warden Minto Urges Better Equipment or Abolishing the Plant.

SALEM, Ore., July 7.—Declaring that because of poor facilities it costs more to manufacture shoes at the penitentiary shoe factory than it does to purchase them in the open market, Warden Minto suggested to the board of control yesterday that the plant be either equipped with modern machinery or abolished. The board instructed him to ascertain the cost of new equipment, and to report at the next meeting.

"The fire destroyed some of the machinery, and if the state is to continue operating the factory considerable more equipment will be needed," said the warden.

Warden Minto asked for permission to put the five women prisoners at the penitentiary at work canning fruit, and it was so ordered.

GOMPERS WANTS SCHOOLS TO TEACH RESPECT FOR WORKERS

NEW YORK, July 7.—The Gary plan of school administration, the obligation of education systems to union labor and peace had their innings in the discussions of the National Education Association meeting here today. Wm. A. Wirt, superintendent of the city schools of Gary, Ind., discussed the Gary plan as organized in his home city and as administered in twelve of the leading public schools in the Bronx, New York City. The Gary plan, he declared, has extended in some form or other to most of the leading city school systems in the country.

Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, advocated training in the schools for efficient work and the teaching in the schools of the doctrine of respect for the rights of the man who carries a dinner pail. Dr. John Dewey, professor of education Columbia University, addressed the association on "Nationalizing Education". Simon D. Fess, member of congress from Ohio, advocated the establishment of a national university at Washington.

One of the really belligerent meetings of the American school peace league, Fanny Fern Andrews, secretary of the league, insists that public school training must finally make for peace at any price. Delegates to the peace league and prominent educators who are guests at the annual banquet in the Hotel Astor differ as to the educational program to best lead to the establishment of peace with honor.

"The formation of an effective world peace court, so nearly accomplished at the second Hague conference," declared Miss Fern Andrews, "should be emphasized as an ideal for which the world has hoped and waited."

PORTLAND, July 5.—Cattle receipts were rather liberal at the opening of the week's trade, 1200 being received Monday. Straight car lots of some excellent steers went at \$8.25 and as much as \$8.50 was realized for a few head. Other grades of cattle were also on a very strong basis and the market in general was fully 25 cents higher than last week's close.

Hogs.

A short run of 3000 head today sold on a very snappy market. An advance of twenty five cents was scored, eight sixty being the top price. The bulk of hogs went at \$8.50 to \$8.55. Market closed strong.

GEORGE DEBAN IN
"THE PAWN OF FATE"
WORLD FILM PRODUCTION

"The Pawn of Fate," with George Deban as the star, will be presented by the World Film Corporation at the Majestic on Saturday.
