A. parcels were wrapped as for mailing, and were brought in in a mail bag, Mr. Carlos Page serving as postman. The demand exceeded the supply as far as packages were concerned, and many were obliged to content themselves with buying an extra portion of ice cream and cake in lieu of the package which had been denied them. Twenty five cents was the charge for each parcel, and the postman was absolutely impartial in the distribution of his mail, allowing each to "grab" for his own in the depths of the bag. Interest ran high until the "prize packages" were unearthed, the lucky persons proving to be Mrs. Elmer McKean, who drew Mrs. Wilson's package, a sheer Madeira handkerchief enclosing her gold crested and autographed card, and Mrs. L. C. Smith, to whose lot fell the package from Mrs. Withycombe. This contained a dainty six-inch hand-made dolly with an edge of crochet and coronation braid, with her personal card enclosed. Mrs. Smith is the mother of Mrs. Carlos Page, and is visiting here from her home in Illinois. Other packages revealed dainty little aprons, towels, dollies, and other articles of handwork. The sale netted \$18 for parcels and refreshments, and a most enjoyable evening was spent by all.

Mrs. William Bell returned last night from an extended visit in Washington with her daughter, Aileen, and her son, Wendell, in Portland.

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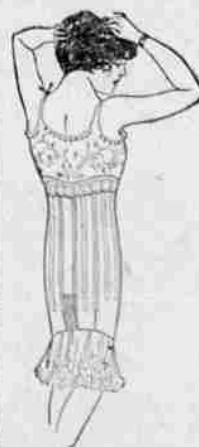
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
