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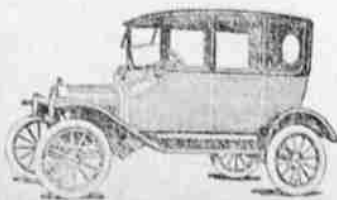

THINK THAT BREMEN HAS BEEN LOST

LONDON, July 12.—Dispatches from Copenhagen indicate that the German super-submarine Bremen, sister ship to the Deutschland, may have been caught in one of the allies' submarine nets and destroyed or may be in the hands of the allies.

Copenhagen dispatches to the Exchange Telegraph quote the Vossische Zeitung as stating that the Bremen left Kiel for the United States a month ago and has not since been reported.

No statement in connection with the Bremen has been given out by the British admiralty, but this is in keeping with custom. For months, no definite reports have been made of submarines destroyed; but it is generally stated that more than 1000 of the divers have been netted or sunk by British gunfire since the war began.

From American dispatches it was learned that the Deutschland took just 16 days to cross from Germany to the United States, and if the Copenhagen quotation of the Vossische Zeitung is correct, it is considered certain that the Bremen has been taken or destroyed.

CROP CONDITIONS.

PORTLAND, July 12.—Following is a summary of the crop conditions in Oregon for the week ending July 11, 1916, as reported to the local office of the weather bureau by special correspondents throughout the state:

Ideal weather prevailed during the week for the growing crops, all of which made splendid advancement. Fall wheat is filling nicely and the prospects for a good crop are much better than anticipated a few weeks ago. Barley is ripening well and in some places it will be ready to harvest within a week or two. Spring wheat, oats and rye have also made excellent growth. Corn has improved greatly, but this crop is still very backward.

The second crop of alfalfa is being harvested and it is better than the first one. It is also being secured under more favorable conditions. Wheat and rye hay are being cut in the eastern counties and timothy and clover are being harvested in the western portions of the state. Ranges are excellent and stock is in fine condition. The potato crop has made splendid advancement during the week, as also have gardens.

The cherry season is drawing to a close, and early peaches, loganberries, raspberries and blackberries are now ripe and being marketed.

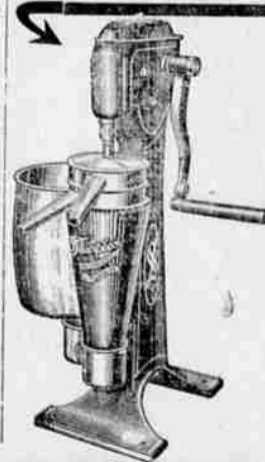

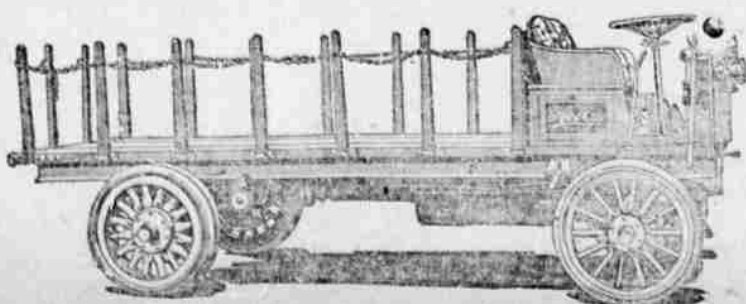
