OFFICERS WILL ASSIST CUPID

Coming to Roseburg upon a promise of marriage, unable to locate the man with whom she was in love and with an attempt made to swindle her out of her meager savings by a fraudulent real estate deal a woman today appealed to the sheriff's office for assistance. According to her story she was living in California when she met the man to whom she is engaged. Shortly before the marriage ceremony was to take place she became ill and she was forced to go to the hospital and submit to an operation which kept her confined to her bed for several weeks. The man in the meantime had gone to Portland, Ore., to attend to business matters, leaving word for her to follow him as soon as she was able and that they would be married in Portland. She reached the Oregon metropolis only to find a message telling her that he had come to Roseburg to look after some timber interests which he held in Douglas county. She immediately came to this city and endeavored to locate him, but has not yet been able to do so.

Shortly after her arrival in this city an attempt was made to sell her a homestead consisting of 126 acres of timber land located within a mile of Roseburg and within a short distance of a saw mill. The insistence of the real estate dealer that she invest her money in this gilt edge proposition finally aroused her suspicion and he made inquiries which led to the disclosure that there was not a homestead within many miles of Roseburg and that 120 acres of timber land were worth much more than \$300, the amount of money for which the land dealer was endeavoring to sell the piece of property.

Unable to secure assistance in any other way she today appealed to the officers. She says she will remain in Roseburg for a few days, as she has not yet given up hope of locating the man with whom she is in love, but if she does not find him soon, she will go to eastern Oregon, where he has a brother living and will locate him by this method. She has secured work and is supporting herself while remaining in this city.

FRUIT CROP IN WESTERN STATES BELOW NORMAL

E. C. Benson, secretary of the Roseburg Merchants Association, today received the following report of the California fruit crop.

Advice, for the state commissioner of horticulture of California, just received, state that the California prune crop for this year under the latest survey indicates a crop of 52 per cent of the normal. A total quantity, therefore, for the year will be about 95 million pounds.

The report on apples indicates that the crop will be slightly less than the normal.

Pears will not exceed 60 to 70 per cent of the normal.

From Idaho it is reported that the prune, apple and pear crops are almost completely destroyed this year by frost.

BE SURE RAW FRUITS AND VEGETABLES ARE CLEAN

Fruits and vegetables are a necessary part of the diet during hot weather. Many of these are more appetizing when eaten raw. Berries, apples, radishes, onions and salads are popular and have their value as food. Care should be exercised in the preparation and serving of green foods, however, as they are subject to much handling between the garden and the table. In many market gardens the gathering of the produce is entrusted to a class of labor which is not any too cleanly; and care seldom is exercised to insure cleanliness.

Food exposed for sale in markets also is often subject to indiscriminate handling by prospective purchasers. As a protection berries and food-stuffs eaten raw should be thoroughly washed before being served. It is much better to risk a slight impairment of the flavor than to chance eating unclean food.

Nightsoil should not be used for fertilizing gardens from which the produce may be eaten raw. Water-cress should not be gathered from streams polluted by sewerage. Many cases are on record where typhoid fever has resulted from failure to heed these points.
