FRENCH REPULSE GERMAN ATTACKS

PARIS, July 21.—It is announced that the French heavily repulsed the German counter attacks against the positions won yesterday. The Germans retreated disorderly. The French bayonneted the German patrol that was attempting to penetrate the lines in the Chaunies region.

English and Germans Clash.

LONDON, July 21.—General Haig reported that the British drove the Germans from the Fourneaux woods north of Longueval, the report indicated that the Germans countered last night, following the new British advances, and temporarily occupied a portion of the woods.

UNIQUE CONTEST FOR COUNTY FAIR

A rather unique contest is being planned by County School Superintendent O. C. Brown to be a part of the county fair. It will be a contest in fruit and vegetable canning, speed and quality being points on which the competition will be judged, the winning team from the county to go to the state fair where it will meet teams from other counties.

Already four teams have been arranged for, one at Yoncalla, two at Roseburg, and one at Riddle. One of the local instructors who is enthusiastic over the work of boys has promised to arrange a boys' team which he is confident will win from the girls.

These contests are very popular in some of the eastern states and have proven a very efficient method of interesting the pupils in such work. In presenting the contest, the teams work at a long table, the fruit being taken in the raw state at one end and after being prepared to a certain point by one of the members of the team, is passed on to the next until at the other end of the table it comes out completely canned and ready to be judged. Speed is not the only matter considered in the judging, but the quality is the really vital factor.

In order to make a more complete organization in preparation for the event and to assist in arranging the details, Miss Helen Cowgill, of the extension department of the Oregon Agricultural college will be in the county next week. Monday she will speak at Yoncalla, Tuesday morning at the Fullerton school and in the afternoon at the Benson school and Wednesday will spend the day at Riddle.

MISS FOX WILL SPEAK AT INSTITUTE

County School Superintendent O. C. Brown announced today that the teachers' institute for Douglas county had been set for October 16, 17 and 18. He has been extremely fortunate this year in securing the services of prominent instructors for the program of the three days, but in addition to the state teachers, who will be present, Miss Fox, of the United States commission of education, will be present and deliver several lectures on primary work. Miss Fox is considered one of the best instructors in this line of the work in the country and her talks will be greatly enjoyed.

Miss Fox will be in Oregon for two months and at the recent meeting of the county superintendents the institutes were so correlated that she will be able to attend them during her visit here. She is considered one of the foremost educators and has been sent out by the U. S. commissioner on special work pertaining to the primary grades. Mr. Brown has also secured the services of some of the most prominent instructors in the state, who will take up the various phases of the school work.

SENATE REVERSES ITSELF ON BETHLEHEM STEEL

WASHINGTON, July 21.—After one of the most bitter debates, the senate reversed itself and refused to permit the Bethlehem Steel Company to print its anti-government armor plate propaganda as a public document. Senator Penrose had previously obtained the unanimous consent of the senate for its printing.

Senator Reed, of Missouri, arrived later and attacked the action bitterly.

SENATOR DENOUNCES THE BRITISH BLACKLIST

WASHINGTON, July 21.—Senator Thomas, of Colorado, denounced the British blacklist as an "outrageous assault against American citizens". He advocated the most severe reprisals, and said: "I cannot understand the widespread sympathy with the allied cause in this country, when England is continually repeating her bull-dozing attacks against our commerce."
