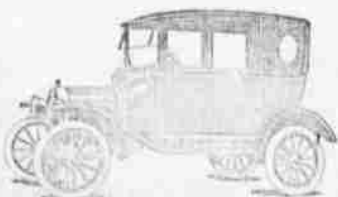

### NEW STATE ROAD SOUGHT

Petitioners Want Pacific Highway and Coach Pass Road Link.

SALEM, July 28.—Construction of a road connecting the new stretch of the Pacific highway being built near Glendale with the Coach Pass road is asked in a petition filed with the state highway commission by residents of the territory adjacent to the proposed road.

The construction of the link, the petitioners declare, will prove the final solution of the long road controversy in that section, and enable people living in Gow creek valley and Wolf creek to cross at Ford and save six miles. The route now through Glendale. The proposed new road would avoid Glendale.
