## FARM LOAN BOARD TO HOLD HEARINGS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4—Secretary McAdoo, chairman ex-officio of the new farm loan board, today notified the four appointive members of their confirmation by the senate, and called a meeting here August 7, when the work of organizing the new system will be inaugurated.

The board will shortly afterwards start hearings throughout the country for the purpose of dividing the United States into 12 federal land bank districts. President Wilson in the meantime will have named an executive head of the board to be known as the farm loan commissioner. Herbert Quick and George W. Norris are spoken of for the place.

Actual operation of the farm loan system probably will not be begun before next spring.
